### Chairman's Report 2017

As you all know, our breed's unrivalled easy calving, conferred by Salers bulls through low birth weights and by Salers cows because of their immense pelvic area, increases the output of live calves and saves costs and losses in numerous ways. This outstanding trait has not passed un-noticed and the last five years have seen accelerating growth in the breed across the suckler farming sector as many hundreds of suckler farmers change to use Salers genetics in their herd each year. 2017 has been our best year yet, as the breed moved up from 10th to 9th largest beef breed in the UK. More Salers/SalersX animals were sold at more sales with record prices being achieved and then surpassed, culminating in a new breed record of 15000 guineas for a bull sold at Castle Douglas. We are welcoming more new members to the Society, and more cattle are being registered.

In response to this rising position in the industry the UK Salers Society has established a range of schemes to assist our members to more professionally manage their herds and with marketing their stock. These include;

- The Society Health Scheme targeting BVD and Johnes (and from 2018 all entries to Society sales must be from herds that are Johnes Risk Level 1 to 4),
- Compulsory DNA testing of herd sires (and from 2018 of all bulls entered to Society sales),
- The Society website and Facebook pages,
- More Society sponsored sales (total of six in 2017)
- BREEDPLAN Performance Recording to give us EBVs.

We recently adopted a new DNA test method (SNP) to allow us to work on genomics alongside the French HB Society and Irish and US/Canadian Salers Societies. It is early days, but genomics is a very important tool for the future.

The next few years will be challenging for all UK livestock farmers, not least because of the uncertainties and changes arising from Brexit. At the very least, it is abundantly clear that we and our customers are going to have work harder in future to remain successful, and this translates directly to our cattle having to produce more income for less cost. On the face of it a depressing prospect, but in my opinion not so, because of course, this is where the Salers comes in to her own.

So in spite of, or because of, the pressures on livestock farming, the prospects are very positive for continued growth in the numbers of Salers cattle in the UK, with all that means for our members and the Salers Society. The future looks exciting for Salers.

This success and growth hasn't just happened out of thin air. It rests solidly on decades of effort and dedication from our members through some very challenging times (F&M, BSE etc.) and I'd like to recognise the contributions made by two of our long standing members who sadly died in 2017. These were Sir Tony Austin (Morwenstow Salers), who was a former Chairman and long-time leader of the effort to develop the breed in the South West, and Bryan Walling (Cumbrian Salers), the Father of the Breed in the UK, first Chairman of the Society and importer of the foundation cows and bulls into the UK. Bryan laid the bedrock for the success of the breed today.

Salers are indeed fine looking cattle, but the success of the breed is not due to its good looks, but to its ability to perform better than the alternatives on commercial suckler farms, most especially in respect of easy calving. Our commercial customers want the easy calving but also want strong daily liveweight gains too. As we select for growth rate, so we must ensure that we protect calving ease:

- Most importantly, when selecting stock bulls, consider their impact on birth weights, ideally by choosing bulls with low to moderate birth weight EBVs.
- Weigh all calves at birth (including commercial and dead calves), and ideally submit this information to Breedplan by ensuring all calves are registered or birth notified.
- If cows and calves can be weighed at weaning and/or youngstock at 13 months old, then become a Performance Recorder and submit this information to Breedplan, which will improve the accuracy of our EBVs.

Whilst the breed continues to flourish it is important to remember not to take our eye off the ball. There are always opportunities to promote the cattle we love.



On a similar note it is important to encourage breeders to register crossbred cattle as Salers X with BCMS, which will help the breed to be noticed and grow commercially.



#### A NEW BREED RECORD!


Salers continue their popularity with breeders, 10 bulls sold through the ring to an average £6,983, up £1,895 on the year.

Kingpin 2, born 13/4/15, sired by Sancy out of Drumaglea Alice is a powerful bull full of presence.




Whitebog Kracker from A. MacKenzie, Ross-shire, sold to Salers breeder P.M. and S.M. Donger, Towcester, Northants.

#### RISING STAR IN THE CATTLE BREEDING WORLD

Chris Berry talks with Salers Chairman Terence Pye at Leven Fields (April '17).



ONE OF THE STARS IN THE cattle firmament right now is the Salers breed and that suits Terence Pye who farms with his wife Jane at Leven Fields, Middleton on Leven, near Yarm. Terence is Chairman of the Salers Cattle Society, a role he took up in November 2016, and his Rigel herd is aptly named for the continuing rise in popularity of the breed as Rigel is a star in the Orion constellation.

'The breed really has taken hold in the last five years even though we've had them since 1991 and they've been in the UK since 1986,' says Terence. 'The data from BCMS has been allowing us to see the growth curve gradually ramping up but in 2016 the breed grew by a huge 10 per cent, making it the fastest growing in the UK.

There are now around 30,000 pure and crossbred Salers breeding cows and we are the ninth largest breed for this in the country.' I think it is the pressures on farming that are forcing everyone to be more careful about cost and making the best of what they have. The message about Salers has now reached that point where people either want to know more or have started to keep them. We're receiving recommendations all the time as the commercial realities are coming to the fore. Cattle men and women now understand what they can do for them.' 'Around half of the customers who come to us are looking for one of the main attributes of the Salers – easy calving. The pelvic opening can be twice as large as some other perhaps better-known breeds and that is making a huge difference.

We've found that the very unique set of traits the British cattle men and women need are encompassed in the Salers.' 'That includes dairy farmers. About a quarter to one-third of the bulls we sell are bought to go into dairy herds. In commercial suckler herds, farmers get sick of having to pull calves out, so to have cows that can



pop calves out without assistance is not just easier, it's also less time consuming. We hardly ever see our cows and heifers calve. We also weigh every calf and ours are in the mid-30 kgs range. I went out a 7am this morning and there was nothing happening. A short while later I went again and one had calved, while another calved in the time I'd checked on the first one. They fly out of them.'

Terence was raised in the London suburb of Caterham near Croydon and came north due to his career with ICI. It was through his brother Malcolm that Terence found his love of cattle. 'Malcolm was interested in farming and had a small holding in Nottinghamshire where he had store beasts on 12 acres. Jane and I would look after the place and the cattle when he and his wife Gillian went on holiday.' 'We then had the idea of setting up in business together and we did just that between Jane, myself, Malcolm and Gillian. Both couples sold our respective homes and bought 90 acres here at Leven Fields plus the farm buildings in 1991. We couldn't afford the farmhouse in the village. Over the years we built up the concern while Malcolm and I had our regular day jobs. Jane and Gillian looked after the farm with Jim Ridley. Jim's a real proper Yorkshire character and had worked for the farmer who had this place before us.' 'We were fortunate that some land came up adjacent that took the acreage to the 208 it is today. It's all down to grass except around 30 acres of woodland and we have a mile and a half of river frontage on the River Leven. We acquired arable land in addition, but sold it when Malcolm and Gillian left the partnership and moved to Scotland where Malcolm had set up an agri business.

Terence and Jane's passion has always been for Salers cattle people. 'Our interest is now wholly cattle. We started with Salers in November 1990 through a crossbred cow and embryo, plus a heifer. We've built the herd up from there. We currently have 55 cows of which three are Charolais with the rest Salers. Bulls are sold at between 20 months to 3 years old and heifers at around 15-18 months. We get the heifers in-calf to our Salers bulls and then sell them as we want the farmer to be able to see what we mean about easy calving. With more than half our customers buying Salers for the first time we want everything to be right.'




Commercial herds are where much of Terence and Jane's production is bound. 'The pedigree market is tiny in comparison to the commercial beef sector. If we sell to a pedigree buyer that's nice but its suckler herds and dairy farmers that are our main areas direct from the farm. We sell just over one-third of our bulls through Salers Society sales throughout the UK. 'We're presently running four pedigree Salers bulls and also use Al. Our bulls live long and are highly productive. We try to use our own homebred bulls and since 2002 we have bought just four French bulls. Bruno, our foundation bull, was just under 14 years old when he finished; Crocodile Dundee was just under 15; and Othello was 14. Byron is current our leading stock bull aged 7.' 'In order to bring fresh blood we bought Lascaux from France, but we are committed to making continued progress with our own bulls and we're producing what we feel are as good as any including Rigel Drambuie Poll, a black bull we have retained as a junior herd sire, and who is an out-and-out commercial farmers' bull giving lots of beef while also good female traits.'


The increase in Salers popularity shown from data collated by BCMS puts the breed as the 10th largest beef breed, using a Salers bull; and the 9th largest of the breeding cows registrations. Terence believes managing the on-going success will be key to the breed's future. 'At the moment, with so many new members coming in, we need to make sure they know enough to select for the breeds core strengths. The Salers has caught on right now and obviously we're very happy that others have realised or are realising what we have known for many years. It's vital that we maintain the standards that have been set and one of those ways is to ensure our members understand and value low to moderate birth weight. 'We've gained a healthy reputation for exceptional calving ease. We could lose it if we as breeders do not remain vigilant to what has got us this far. The Society has implemented performance recording using BREEDPLAN, which provides EBVs so Salers bulls can be selected for low to moderate birth rates. My advice would be don't get distracted by high growth rates because that can lead to high birth weights which can inevitably lead to calving problems. We need to play to our strengths.' 'Last year we achieved 100 per cent unassisted births across our entire Salers herd and there were four sets of twins too.'

And if you've not yet seen reference to Salers beef on a UK menu you should try Paris. 'It's marketed as high end, gourmet beef in Paris under the name Label Rouge. If you're over there and you see a little red cow's head on the menu that's Salers beef. It has great marbling and is exceptionally tasty.'

Terence and Jane have also worked hard at developing polled genetics within their herd over the past 20 years. 'It's another important part of our business as a premium is commanded on polled cattle.'

Jane and Terence have two daughters – Emma and Helen. Emma assists on the farm with son-in-law Scott. The herd prefix Rigel came from Terence's father's business. 'He had a company called Rigel Electronics. Who would have known that it would come to be associated with a rising star breed in the cattle world! We're all making every effort to keep it moving upwards.'





#### MARKET REVIEW

### **Salers Strong Growth Continues in 2017**

#### What is this all about?

Though it is interesting to know about the market in which we operate, the key point and only real purpose of the market review is to assist our breeders and our customers to make better decisions about the future direction of their businesses.

The most important conclusion from the review is that the Salers breed is growing just about as fast as it possibly can in the suckler cow sector, and that this growth is limited by the availability of Salers and SalersX heifers coming forward as replacement Commercial suckler farmers are suckler cows. scouring the country for Salers heifers and some have been obliged to source them from France because they cannot find sufficient numbers here in the UK.

Whether you are breeding SalersX or pure heifers, what decisions do you need to make to ensure that the maximum number end up as suckler cows, whilst ensuring that the quality is maintained?

#### **High Level**

The Salers annual growth in 2017 continues the progress made in 2016, outstripping overall market growth to claim increased market share.

#### **Market Overview**

There was again a small increase in the number of suckler cows, but by a smaller percentage than last vear. The number of UK dairy cows dropped for the first time since 2010, but the upward trend to using beef sires continued with 45% of calves from the dairy herd being by a beef bull.

The number of beef sired calves born in 2017 increased to 1.85 million mostly because of the increased use of beef sires on dairy cows. Five of the top ten beef breeds registering a reduction in calves born compared to 2016. indicating that the slightly better numbers seen in 2016 were a blip.

The overall market future growth trends are far from clear as farmers are facing uncertainty as to the impact of Brexit on prices, input costs and farm support payments, however the ability of the Salers to lower the costs of beef production (because of our outstanding calving ease), means that the Salers breed will thrive even (or perhaps especially) in tough times.


The growth in the use of the Salers bull has continued, registering the highest growth rate amongst the top ten beef breeds in the suckler herd and 2nd highest growth rate when the use of beef bulls on dairy cows is taken into account. The Salers bull is now 9th in the league table up from 10th place last year. The breed immediately above the Salers has a market share of 1.6% vs. our 1.5% market share, but it is not growing like the Salers. so a move up to 8th is possible in the next year or two.


In the suckler cow market, Salers have the fastest annual rate of increase of any of the top ten beef breeds for the second year running, and are firmly 9th in the suckler cow league table, with the 8th place also within our reach in the next couple of years. An analysis of the market dynamics last year indicated that the breed could grow even faster but demand is outstripping the supply of Salers and SalersX heifer replacements available. Just to continue growing as we are, 5000-6000 Salers and SalersX heifers are needed annually as replacements. The entries of commercial heifers to Society sales amount to approx. 5% of this demand.

The difficulty of finding sufficient numbers of commercial heifers has become more noticeable in 2017, as suckler farmers have become more aware of the financial and lifestyle benefits that derive from the breed's very large pelvic area, plentiful milk, sound structure (legs, feet, udders etc.) and longevity, which all make for the low maintenance, low cost suckler cow that is needed in today's market. Also, there are clear signs that buyers are increasingly looking to source heifers from high health status herds.

#### **Prospects for 2018**

Looking back over a longer period of time, we can see that the Salers has been significantly outperforming the beef sire and suckler cow markets for many years. These are conservative markets, and it has taken years of effort by our members to create the level of awareness of the Salers performance traits that has stimulated these strong growth rates. The good news is that once established, these growth trends are very likely to continue, as the qualities of the breed prove themselves on farm, and so influence more farmers to switch to Salers.





#### Demonstrating Salers Commercial Advantages



#### **PROTECTING SALERS BULLS EASE OF CALVING**

The substantial growth in demand for Salers bulls over the last five years is due the Salers reputation for outstanding calving ease.

This is attracting suckler (and dairy) farmers who have put easy calving at the top of their priorities. The Salers bull confers easy calving via:



- the long slender conformation of the calf
- low birth weights (compared to other major breeds)

Calves by Salers bulls are typically 32-36kg for heifers and 35-40kg for bulls. Protecting this attribute is vital for the continued growth of the breed, and the availability of Birth Weight EBVs from Breedplan gives our breeders and our customers the information they need in respect of calving ease when selecting bulls for breeding. The range from light (-2.7kg) to heavy (+3.2kg) Birth Weight EBVs in the Published Sires table below has increased since last year. Light or moderate birth weight EBVs are favourable.

#### **BETTER BIRTH WEIGHT DATA**

2017 ytd, 54% of calves had their birth weight recorded, continuing the upward trend.

The Society strongly encourages members to weigh all their calves at birth, and to submit birth weights when calves are being registered or notified. This is entirely voluntary and can be done free of charge by any member whether or not they are Performance Recorders. Members can weigh calves using scales or the weigh tape (measuring the front foot). Both methods are equally acceptable, with the main consideration being to make the measurement as consistently as possible

from one calf to the next. Passing the 50% recorded birth weights mark is a significant milestone, as this improves the accuracy and usefulness of the Birth Weight EBV.

#### **PROGRESS WITH** PERFORMANCE RECORDING

Our Performance Recorders have increased the amount of data submitted to Breedplan in 2017 by 29% compared to 2016. Breedplan is receiving regular weights of young stock, mature cow weights, scrotal circumferences of young bulls, and figures from back fat scanning. The accuracies of the Birth Weight, 200 and 400 Day Weight EBVs are steadily improving, with some sires already above 90%. The Milk EBV, however, should be treated with caution as it will take a longer time to reach an acceptable accuracy as the contribution to growth rate from milk is inferred from data gathered over a number of generations.

#### **ACCURACY OF EBVS**

Each EBV comes with an assessment of its accuracy, which reflects the amount of data used to calculate the EBV and also the stability of the EBV as new data comes in. The following guide may be useful for interpreting accuracy:

- less than 50% accuracy the EBVs are preliminary. EBVs in this range will have been calculated based on very little information. These EBVs could change substantially as more direct performance information becomes available on the animal.
- 50-74% accuracy the EBVs are of medium accuracy. EBVs in this range will usually have been calculated based on the animal's own performance and some limited pedigree information.
- 75-90% accuracy the EBVs are of medium-high accuracy. EBVs in this range will usually have been calculated based on the animal's own performance coupled with the performance for a small number of the animal's progeny.
- more than 90% accuracy the EBVs are a high accuracy estimate of the animal's true breeding value. It is unlikely that EBVs will change considerably with addition of more progeny data.

The Published Sires table below does not show the accuracies but bulls only make it onto this table if their accuracies are above 50%. Information on individual animals, their EBVs and their accuracies can be looked up by anyone (follow the links from the Salers website (http://salers-cattle-society.co.uk/).

# **Accidental Breeders**



#### **Harperley Salers**

Paul Allison and Tanya Devereux (Allison Devereux Farms)

Low Harperley Farm is a typical medium sized County Durham mixed farm sitting at the bottom end of Weardale. When Paul and Tanya took over the farm in 2013, it came with a dairy bred suckler herd of Limousin x cows, and much of the grassland was in a stewardship scheme.

Paul and Tanya never intended to become pedigree cattle breeders. As Paul says, "We just wanted to be better beef suckler farmers. I'm from a heavy manufacturing industry background, where assets are squeezed and production maximised, and a traditional dairy bred suckler herd running on low input grassland in stewardship made no sense to us whatsoever. The land was going back to waste and we had suckler cows with low fertility and frequent calving problems."

The farm has relatively high fixed costs with everything done in house (except spraying), including all the arable and grassland work. Consequently the farm has to have turnover and productivity. "Coming out of stewardship early helped, and although it's not been straightforward, we've got back to the position where we grow acceptable amounts of grass. Over the last few years, we've put up a few sheds ourselves and are close to a stocking rate of 1 LSU per acre with matching winter housing."

Paul and Tanya were dissatisfied with the farm's existing suckler herd. "We had some good productive cows, but the replacement policy was a game of dairy bred heifer roulette; lucky to land a good one and who knew what disease was being brought in? Essentially our herd was the product of other people's breeding policies, none of which had anything to do with improving our cows."

The easy bit was identifying the problems. The solution took a bit more working out. They came up with an aspirational list for the suckler herd.

- Closed herd, health monitoring and vaccinations for disease prevention
- Increased numbers and stocking density without increased recurring fixed costs
- Pure bred, good natured, easy calving cows with milk, fertility and conformation
- · Most cows put to terminal sires
- · Best cows bred pure for replacements
- First calving at 23 months
- Well grown young bulls and heifers sold as stores at 12 months

"That was clearly putting us into pure bred maternal beef cow territory. We looked at Beef Shorthorns, Simmentals, Stabilisers, Luings, South Devons, Lincoln Reds and Herefords; there are a lot of breeds out there for the single breed closed herd system but none of them were ticking all the boxes. Fortuitously, whilst driving through northern France, I passed a field full of horned red cows with enormous beige calves and a massive Charolais bull and stopped to ask the man what was going on; Salers; that's what was going on."



The couple discovered that the Salers breed was established in the UK and growing in numbers, and that its traits fitted their aspirations. They decided to give Salers a try, and started to build up a small herd of pure and crossbred Salers. "The heifer calves were retained and our Salers numbers grew, but once the traditional suckler herd was dispersed, the farm was understocked. The demand for Salers females has been increasing greatly and boosting our numbers with straight runs of quality heifers at sensible money was not easy. Nevertheless, we had to get numbers up and so during 2017 we imported two loads of heifers from the Cantal Mountains."

### Accidental Breeders continued...



With around 250 acres of grass for summer 2018, the farm will be running 110 Salers cows and calves, 85 Salers bulling heifers and 390 Llyen ewes. The focus at Low Harperley is on producing hardworking commercial suckler cows. They have to be good natured, easy calving (large pelvic apertures and likely to have small calves), fertile, milky and long lived. The bulling heifers are all put to a Salers bull to calve at 23 to 25 months. For the second calf onwards, the choice is made whether the cow goes to the Salers bull to produce breeding stock calves or to the Charolais bull to produce stores. "We don't think there's anything better than the Charolais cross Salers system for a commercial suckler herd. It's no surprise that it's the only cross you ever see in France; the Salers cows are almost designed for the job and their Charolais x calves are phenomenal, with serious growth and great conformation".

The plan was to have 80% of the cows with Charolais bulls and 20% with the Salers. It's turned out to be the other way around. Initially the drive was to get the Salers numbers up, but now this has been achieved. Paul and Tanya are thinking they'll keep it that way. There is a premium on the Charolais cross stores, but it's balanced by the premium on Salers bulling heifers.




"Having started with Salers to build a better commercial suckler herd producing strong stores, we have ended up being a producer of bulling heifers and a few breeding bulls."

The main Salers stock bull is Rigel Pluto, the breed's easiest calving Breedplan recorded bull. "We have some his daughters in the herd, but we would be happy if they were all his daughters. The only obstacle to that happening is the market demand for his calves. We probably sold a few too many this year; we set reasonable prices and they flew off the farm. Because we've focussed on producing strong, efficient and productive commercial cows for ourselves, the heifers are exactly right for modernising suckler herds."

Pluto's sons are particularly suited to covering heifers and producing suckler replacements. "We've been delighted to see them heading off

to work in large commercial herds. We don't suppose any of our animals will ever win a show, but we like them and they do the job".



Comparing their Salers cows with their previous sucklers, there has been a major reduction in calving problems, and improved % of calves weaned per cow. "We like maternal lines in Salers, to the extent that we have imported a few heifers out of a Salers milking herd and we are very happy with them. Breeders in France and the UK can influence the way a breed goes and we think we need to stay away from full on terminal traits. The animals that we want to produce are unashamedly maternal animals".

"Some people get into Salers for easy calving and good mothering to reduce the amount of work they have to do for the same number of cows and calves. We went for Salers to get numbers, productivity, output and turnover up without increasing the work. So far, the performance of the Salers very much backs up our decision, and we are looking forward with confidence despite the uncertainties facing UK farming."

## **Area 1 Report Northern Scotland 2017**



The highlight of 2017 was a trip to Orkney. John Copeland, retired auctioneer and secretary of the Orkney Discussion Group asked Alan Howatson, Robbie Milne and I if we would attend their meeting on 30th January.

On a cold and frosty morning, Alan, Robbie and I set out for the island of Orkney.

John Copeland had arranged a few farm visits for us during our stay. The first was that afternoon when we went to David and Bruce Groat at Cloke, Dounby. The Groats have 70 cows and use 2 Salers bulls and 1 Limousin. All progeny which are not kept for breeding are sold fat at Kirkwall Mart. The bull in the photo is 10 years old and bred by a certain Rachel Hallos!!

The discussion group meeting was on the Monday evening and was attended by 75 farmers. Robbie and Alan gave excellent talks on their farms detailing the benefits of using Salers. I also added my views of the use of Salers and told them about the Irish genotyping. This was followed by a very good discussion which progressed into the bar and was finally drawn to a close at 1.15 am !!

John had arranged a full itinerary for Tuesday. The first call was to Steven Sandison at Millburn Farms. He has 120 cows and uses both Salers and simmental bulls. Steven held the first QMS monitor farm in Orkney and his attention to detail on both grass management and ratio of calf weight to mother's weight was very interesting.

Terry and Lee Coghill are well known in the pedigree cattle world and select bulls for customers who cannot take time to go south. They have taken many Salers bull to Orkney for customers. They were waiting their first Salers calves having acquired a bull the previous year. The aim was to move towards easier calving.

From there we went on to Newbigging where most of the cows stay in an enormous slatted court. This was north facing on the top of a hill where there was nothing between it and the arctic. We were told it was much colder that the north pole.

A visit to Alison Ritch at Keirfiold, Sandwick was next on the agenda. She was very pleased with the results of her breeding programme which used a Salers bull on her Angus and Limousine cows. A much appreciated lunch was provided in the very warm kitchen!

The final visit of the day was to Alistair and Ian Clark, Stratheast Holm where they had 140 cows using mostly Simmental and Salers bulls. The Salers was used on the heifers for ease of calving and they now have a number of 4 year old Salers cross cows. They are very pleased with the outcome.

On Wednesday, after a very full and exhausting visit we caught the ferry south. On the journey we discussed our trip and came to the conclusion that the Salers breed has a strong foothold in Orkney with the potential to challenge the other maternal breeds. The main points sighted were always the ease of calving, better feet and udders, and a high conception rate.

The Orcadians were very hospitable and greatly appreciated us making the effort to attend their discussion as well as the excellent farm visits organised by John Copeland.

# **Area 2 Report South West Scotland 2017**

2017 saw new members joining and more Salers breeders establishing in South West Scotland. Castle Douglas sale had higher numbers of commercial cattle brought forward, but still short of buyers requirements. The sale saw 2 new exhibitors equal the top price with in calf heifers, however the yearling heifers brought out by Colin Mc Clymont of the Cuil took the champion ticket, top price and the top average in the commercial section. The sale overall secured its highest ever average

of £1372, for commercial heifers proving the increased demand for this easy calving breed.

With Brexit looming the market may become even more volatile and uncertain. This focuses the mind on what we can improve on farm, with key performance indicators like calves reared per cow and cow fertility becoming even more vital. This is where the Salers and Salers cross cows really come into their own with great fertility, low birth weights and good growth rates on all types of ground and conditions. With the average suckler cow herd only achieving 82% calves reared per cow. This is an area where real improvements can be made to future proof businesses. The Salers breed can help with that!







Once again the Salers breed is going from strength to strength and has never been in such a good place. The positive aspects of the breed just keep growing with Salers standing up to the competition in the market place both commercially and pedigree.

The Salers have an ability to adapt to any farming system making them a sustainable, practical and easily managed suckler cow for all areas and land conditions.

Increase in demand and keen buyers have produced record prices and excellent clearance at sales in the last year highlighting the sound economic reasons for purchasing the breed. Demand for females is outstripping supply.

The breed is now well established in the UK for their unrivalled ease of calving - nothing is truer than 'profit starts with a live calf'.

Having purchased my first Salers bull to put on my dairy cows I believe it is the perfect beef cross for the dairy herd - a stress free calving with a calf that gets up and sucks saves so much time, money and frustration. The cow recovers quickly without losing condition so can be got straight back in calf to keep a tight calving index. The reduced stress encourages increase milk yield and extended life span. Along with a strong calf with real market value it is the ideal solution in today's demanding market conditions.

Within the area the breed has had excellent commercial sales at Newark and Melton livestock markets. Success has been achieved in the show ring at county shows with a Salers Interbreed champion at Derby, reserve interbreed champion at Leicester and reserve Junior interbreed at Nottinghamshire county.

It would be great to see more members showing this year. It does take a lot of time and effort but it well repaid by great social events and promoting your breed/ herd

# 2017 Castle Douglas Society Sale November

Living up to his name Bacardi Legend achieved a new breed record of 15,000gns for Roy and Adam Crockett Growing demand for low maintenance, easy calving suckler cattle, ensured a cracking trade for pedigree and commercial Salers cattle at the breed's society sale at Castle Douglas,



where a new breed record of 15,000gns was achieved.

Add to that increased averages, often with more sold, in most of sections and breeders had plenty to celebrate come the end of the day.

"It has been a great sale," said Robin Anderson, auctioneer at Wallets Marts, Castle Douglas.

"Breeders have worked hard to bring some of the best pedigree and crossbred Salers cattle here for years and the breed is certainly now firmly established as a breeder of easy calving, quality suckler females."

It was a point echoed by breed chairman Terence Pye, who owns the Rigel herd from North Yorkshire.

"We're absolutely delighted the way the sale has gone, especially when Scotland has suffered some horrendous wet weather and there are real issues with forage supplies," said Mr Pye.

"We had a great sale at Welshpool and we had just as good a sale here

with plenty of people looking to buy Salers bulls and heifers. The breed is growing faster now than it ever has done, but then farmers now realise Salers and the cross-bred Salers are such easy-calving females, requiring little work and feeding."

He added: "The breed is now the eighth largest beef breed in the country and is growing fast, and that's all based on the performance of the females."

Although renowned for their maternal characteristics, it was the male champion that sold for a new breed record of 15,000gns to superceed the previous best of 12,000gns paid twice at Stirling in February.

This new high came for Roy and Adam Crockett's male champion at the pre-sale show and champion winner from the Great Yorkshire Show, Bacardi Legend. Going all the way here for the father and son team who run just 15 pedigree Salers alongside a further 65 commercials at Deanfoot, Denholm, Hawick, was an 18-month-old son of the French import, Gulliver – a bull that bred a former reserve champion at the Great Yorkshire for the team.

The dam, Bacardi Icandy, a Seawell Fortune daughter, produced Legend at two years of age and calved her second a year later. Brother and sister duo, John and Hazel Martin of the Swinlees herd forked out the cash for their mixed pedigree and commercial unit from Dalry, Ayrshire.

While the Bacardi bull topped the sale it was Colin McClymont's Cuil herd from Palnure, Newton Stewart, which undoubtedly enjoyed the best of the trading selling the next top priced bull at 7800gns, and the second equal top priced females at 3000gns twice.

In addition, Mr McClymont who also won the award for the best pen of cross-bred heifers, saw his commercial trade rise £208 per head on the year, when he sold 54 yearling heifers to a top of £1850 to average £1606.

Dearest here at 7800gns was Cuil King, a two-year-old son of Cumbrian Jonnie - a bull bought at Stirling, where he stood pre-sale champion, from the late Brian Walling, which has since bred sons to 8000gns at United Auctions - out of Cuil Tina, a daughter of Chapelpark Target. King sold north to Aberdeenshire for pedigree and commercial work at Milton of Cullerlie, Echt, purchased by Ian McIntyre.

Leading Mr McClymont's heifer trade at 3000gns twice were the first two daughters of Knottown Nector - a son of the French bull, Variegeouis, bought privately in Southern Ireland. The first, Cuil Karen, is out of Cuil Emma by Cleuchhead Xerox - a bull bought here for 8000gns. She sold to Welsh pedigree breeder, Harry Pritchard, Llwyngwyn, Gwynedd, who the previous night was awarded the Cuil Trophy for the best ambassador of the breed throughout 2017.

Minutes later, Michael Dumbreck, Skelton on Ure, Ripton, bought Cuil Klot for the same money. She is bred from Cuil Dot, a daughter of the French sire Blazer. The two, two-year-old heifers both sold in calf to the

Heifers from Mr McClymont's production sale also sold well with in-calf heifers at 2700gns and 2600gns twice. The former, Cuil Kimberley, by Whitebog Ensign and again due to Jordan, was knocked down to pedigree Simmental breeders, Gerald and Morag Smith, Drumsleed, Fordoun.

Neil Ralston, farm manager of Edgerston Trading's 80-cow Kaimburn herd from Jedburgh, also came up with the goods for his first year selling here too, with a 7200gns sale for Kaimburn Laser.

Mr Ralston, who was 'convinced' of the easycare and ease of calving merits of Salers by fellow breeders and now sees the cattle outperform the farm's commercial sheep enterprise in terms of margins, saw his bull sell to society member Robbie Milne, Inverurie.

Laser which stood second in his class at the Great Yorkshire and at the pre-sale show is by the privately purchased Seawell Highlander and out of Oaklands Gaelic, which was also bought privately.

Matching the 7200gns sale, Northern Ireland breeders, John Elliott, Drumlegagh, Newtownstewart, sold Drumlegagh Kurt, to Alex and Jonathan Wright, who own the Traboyack pedigree herd which run alongside 120 Salers cross cows at Pinmore Mains, Girvan. Senior champion at the Pedigree Calf Fair Beef Expo, in Northern Ireland last year, this two-year-old is by the French sire Fanfan and bred from the Ashbury Jaguar daughter, Drumlegagh Eve.

Bulls from Alister McKenzie and son Alister who run the Whitebog herd from Fortrose, again proved popular with sales at 7000gns and 5600gns. The dearest, Whitebog Karbolic, a 28-month-old, which stood senior male and reserve champion at the pre-sale show, is by Whitebog Sandy - a Lascar son used on loan that bred the 10,000gns Whitebog Kipper sold at Stirling in February – while the dam was the Seawell Diplomat daughter, Whitebog Gwen. He sold back up north with H MacDonald, Mains of

Later, Whitebog Leopard, brought out by free-lance stockman, Jimmy Laing, made 5600gns selling to Norman Lawrence Blackpots, Auchnagatt, Aberdeenshire. He is a direct son of the 3600gns Seawell Diplomat, a bull that has bred numerous high four-figure priced bulls to include a 12,000gns seller at Stirling in February.

Back amongst the females, Ian and Tom Walling's pre-sale champion, Cumbrian Charmaine 831 from Over Whitlaw, Selkirk, secured the lead heifer price of 3300gns when selling to Niall & Katy Blair, Glen Isla. Their rising two-year-old, is by Lataster Hector, a bull bought in Southern Ireland and the sire of a former 10,000gns bull sold here from the herd. Bred from a previous home-bred Charmaine, by the French sire, Vaillant, she sold in calved to the homozygous polled bull, Cumbrian Roger.

Lot No 13 proved anything but unlucky for breed chairman, Terrence Pye, from Middleton on Leven, Yarm, when Rigel Delphine Poll was awarded the junior female championship and went on to top the bulling heifer section at 2700gns selling over the telephone to D Kirrane, Carrentubber, Tubbercurry, Co Sligo. This was a 16-month-old daughter of Rigel Munro, a bull retained for breeding, out of the Rigel Picasso-sired Rigel Delta Poll. Leading the commercial in-calf section at £1850 were two pens from local breeders, RA Austin, Boreland of Girthon, Gatehouse of Fleet and R and L Howat, Kinnaird, Dairsie, Fife. The first pen of two, was knocked down to J and IH McFadzean, Glenvernoch, Newton Stewart, with the latter, a pen of three, selling to Ian and Dot Goldie, Greenfield, Cummertrees,

# Bryan Walling 17 Sept 1934 – 5 March 2017



Bryan Walling, one of the UK's most renowned breeders of pedigree livestock, passed away in 2017. His influence on cattle breeds in the United Kingdom, Salers in particular, is widely acknowledged by those in the industry.

Throughout his life, Bryan tackled everything with energy and lively enthusiasm. He was ambitious and had a single minded determination – from nothing, he built up pedigree herds of Herefords and latterly Salers that were recognised world-wide. He was born and brought up at Crosthwaite, Cumbria, an area where his family had been for generations. Much later he moved to a farm near Selkirk, in the Scottish Borders. As a child, despite his family's wishes, Bryan was determined to get into farming and animal breeding. This was against all the odds as his father was not a farmer but a cattle haulier - and there were no farm buildings or land for him to use.

It all began when he was given a Northern Dairy Shorthorn calf and he kept White Leghorn chickens to earn some money – he then built up the numbers of dairy shorthorns, rented some land and had a portable milking parlour. Such was his ability to breed pedigree cattle that the milk from his expanding dairy herd soon began winning awards for top butter fat percentages while

the cattle secured top awards and prices at breed shows and sales throughout the country, including the Great Yorkshire. It was in the 1950s he began to breed Hereford cattle, eventually with his cousin Bob Hudson joining him to form the partnership Cumbria Cattle Breeders. Bryan and Bob began to be successful in the show ring and were recognised for the quality of their cattle and the way they were turned out. Bryan was a perfectionist. He maintained that it was his skill at art and a good eye which led to his interest in animal conformation and breeding show cattle. Some may remember from the early days the Hereford stock bull Haven Ben whose progeny won top prizes for Cumbria Cattle Breeders at most of the major shows in Scotland and England.

Bryan was always forward thinking when it came to cattle breeding. In 1975 he imported a Hereford bull and 20 heifers from Canada to introduce the poll factor to his herd and to breed the larger more modern type of Hereford to suit commercial breeders. Included was the polled bull Battledore Challenger who, after 12 months was sold to F. W. McMordie & Son, Northern Ireland where he became Bull of the Year on several occasions. Another famous Hereford stock bull used in the Cumbria herd was PF 1 Landscape who was overall champion at the National Poll Show in 1977.

Bryan had a keen eye for top quality breeding in any animal and although he was never involved in the Aberdeen Angus breed, when looking for Polled Herefords to purchase in Canada, in 1975 - he spotted an Angus heifer that he liked the look of. She was imported with his Hereford purchases and was shown by Bryan and Bob on behalf of the breeders. That heifer was Cee Bar Favourite 8th. She was sold for 20,000 guineas and achieved Supreme Champion at the Royal Show in 1980 and Highland Show in 1981. Notably, she has more show winning descendants than any other female in modern times and is listed as one of the most influential Angus females in the world.

Another breed whose potential Bryan spotted was the Dutch dual purpose red and white Meuse Rhine Issel. He believed it could have a contribution to make in the UK dairy herds, particularly in improving the value of the dairy bull calf. He imported the first MRI cattle and launched the MRI Cattle Society of the United Kingdom, with his wife Fiona taking on the role of secretary. He also travelled to Australia and brought in the llawarra Shorthorn - an extreme dairy type - which was used in several local Shorthorn herds.

In the 1980s Bryan managed to purchase the land he had been renting but around the same time the market for Herefords collapsed due to the competition from continental cattle. Not to be defeated, Bryan imported 60 Salers cows and four bulls in 1984, after being impressed with the French breed which originated in a region of France not unlike the Lake District. These were the first Salers to be imported into the country and the Salers Cattle Society of the UK was set up. Amongst them was the well-known bull Vainqueur as well as several heifers that would become the foundation of well-known female lines throughout the UK e.g. Vignette, Valise and Veinarde. A later import, Bruno, also became famous in the show ring and as a stock bull. Other bulls associated with the herd at in Cumbria were Crocodile Dundee, French Connection, Jaguar and Thunderbird. Several successful production sales were held at Crosthwaite. Cattle there were usually presented in working condition – Bryan's belief being that youngstock, particularly females, should not be pushed but should be allowed to grow naturally on the hill-land into big, clean-fleshed easy calving cows. An embryo unit was set up on the farm with embryos and semen being exported from Cumbria to countries all over the world. Thanks to Bryan's foresight and hard work the Salers breed is now firmly established across the UK.

After markets and fortunes changed, Bryan and his family decided to look for a farm in Scotland with a greater acreage and better quality land for livestock. After five years of looking, the partnership of Bryan, Fiona and Bob, now known as Farmstock Genetics, purchased Over Whitlaw Farm, Selkirk - and the whole family moved there in 1996. A small nucleus of the Salers genetics was the foundation of the new expanding herd which was run alongside a flock of pedigree Lleyn ewes. For a time, Bryan also extended an interest in rare breeds of cattle with Belted Galloway, Longhorn, White Park and Kerrys roaming the fields at Over Whitlaw - plus a small herd of his beloved

Bryan was well travelled. He said he'd travelled the equivalent of four times around the world, visiting Chile, Argentina, Zimbabwe, Iran, Thailand to name but a few. He was president of the International Salers Federation in the late 1990s and judged in many countries. He made lifelong friends as a result of his love of western Canada and his annual pilgrimage to the National Western Stock Show in Denver, USA. Success in the show ring continued with winners nearly every year at major shows with both cattle and sheep. Bryan also became a well-known face at the LLeyn sheep sales in Scotland, where Farmstock Genetics would regularly achieve the top prices for ewe lambs.

Within the Salers community Bryan will be remembered particularly for the development of the polled strain within the UK. The foundation of the Ladybird polled female line was a heifer in the first importation from France in 1984. The line has been and continues to be massively important to the herd and to the breed. At a reduction sale in 1996 the top price of 5,400 gns was paid for a half share in the heifer calf Cumbrian Ladybird 10, a polled heifer by Lowca Grandee. Half-share in another 16-month old heifer, Cumbrian Ladybird 8, sold for 2,600 gns. More recently, one of the greatest achievements was when Farmstock Genetics bred and sold back to French breeders the homozygous polled bull Cumbrian Joker. Joker was well accepted in France and now his semen and embryos are selling worldwide. The Salers herd at Over Whitlaw remains one of the most prolific in the breed, selling heifers to a top of 6,000 gns at Castle Douglas and, in 2015, smashing the breed record price through a UK market with Cumbrian Capermello at 10,000 gns.

Bryan always made it clear to others that he was indebted to Bob Hudson for his commitment and for his expertise in turning out cattle to high standards at Shows and Sales. Also the fact that his children Katie-Jo, Tom and Ian had obviously inherited their father's eye and standards, when it came to animal breeding and showing, must have made him proud and been a source of great satisfaction to him. They are his legacy who will be carrying on his life's work in the Scottish Borders and beyond.

# **Neil Austin**

## SALERS PROVE THEIR HARDINESS OUT ON THE HILLS

Drawn in by their easy calving potential, good temperaments and longevity, father and son team, David and Neil Austin who farm around 2650 acres in Kirkcudbrightshire, are firm converts to Salers cattle, running around 370 Salers and Salers cross Angus cows at Boreland of Girthon and nearby Rusko Farms, Gatehouse of Fleet.



While the home farm at Boreland extends to 950 acres and comprises 240 Salers and Salers cross Angus cows, 180 Black Face ewes and 400 Mules, the addition of the neighbouring 1700-acre hill estate at Rusko Farms, which has been contract farmed since 2010, has enabled the family to expand and make full use of the Salers somewhat 'easy-care' attributes and to run their 300 pure Blackies.

"Our main aim is to keep producing heifers and maintaining a high health status," said Neil whose family bought their first Salers bull in 1990, with the first pure Salers cows originating from late Graham McClymont's Cuil herd. Now, some 370 cows are run between the two



units of which most are home-bred females from Boreland.

"We need our cows to be easy calvers as the contract farm is six miles from home which allows us to check our calvers twice a day," said Neil, who completed his agricultural studies at Harper Adams in 2000, just when the family took over the contract farming business.

"Salers are a maternal cattle breed and are easy to work with; we run too many cows to take any risks, problem cows are identified and culled, we are busy enough to keep cattle with poor temperaments'

The Salers breed which is recognised by its mahogany red coat, originate from the central region of France and are known for their good feet and legs and ability to survive in harsh environments making them a perfect breeding female for the hill farming climate.

When Neil and his father took over the contract for Rusko Farms their 60 cattle comprised a mix of Blue Grey cross Simmental females which were proving difficult to work with due to bad temperaments and lack of handling. However, with the introduction of the Salers, supplied initially by the Boreland of Girthon herd and a change in calving policy from all year round to spring, life is now a lot better for the 130 strong Salers mixed herd.

"Since the bad winter of 2012, we have realised life is so much easier calving cows all at the one time, instead of calving cows outside during the winter and often in bad weather, when many of the calves hideaway and are difficult to find," explained David. "We have found Salers to be easy calvers with excellent longevity on average, our hill heifers calve at three years of age on the hill and produce around 10 calves before coming down to the home farm and having more where they can be more closely monitored," said Mr Austin.

The breed is proving particularly fertile too, with the Salers calving at Rusko having produced 126 live calves out of 134 cows this year. whilst also delivering tight calving patterns with 105 calves being born within the first three and a half weeks. They calve outside on their own too from the beginning of April, in a three-acre sand pit area which provides a good dry bed for new mothers, for around nine weeks.

"We have found the ease of calving when put to a Salers bull is phenomenal," added Mr Austin.

At six to eight months of age, calves are brought down from the hills, weaned and brought to Boreland where they are in wintered on silage and straights.

Last year the Austin's sold 60 bullocks across April and August, averaging at £900 each with the first store sales in the spring at Castle Douglas where they were reaching up to 400kg in target weight with the rest selling in the August sale at around 450kg.

"Typically, we look to sell our yearling bull calves at 400kg target weight in the spring. said Mr Austin.

The Salers breed minimises costs on the farm not only through stress free calving and longevity but also due to their foraging ability and winter hardiness.



Salers can be kept out at grass

year-round and this is a necessity for the hardier cattle grazed on the hill farm at Rusko which survive and develop well out on the hills year-

On the home farm at Boreland the cows are kept out at grass in the summer and brought in and fed on silage and straights in the winter to ease management.

"On the hill farm at Rusko the ground quality isn't good enough to calve at two, at Boreland we have spring and summer calving which gives us flexibility to calve at two and half years." said Neil.

The Austin's grow their own silage which has allowed them to roll 1700 bales at Rusko Farms and at the home farm they have had two cuts of silage from 220 acres which will feed the herd over winter.

The Austin's first sold bulling heifers at the society sale in Castle Douglas in 2015, 20 bulling heifers from the Rusko herd at 18-21 months went for £960-£980 each; in 2016 they sold 22 bulling heifers, whilst picking up the prize for reserve champion pen and increasing their prices to £1199 per animal and in 2017 they sold 33 bulling heifers to £1550 per animal along with in calf heifers to £1850 thus showing the improvement in the market of their stock.

Neil Austin reveals plans for the future of their contract and home farm. "We hope to make improvements at Rusko Farms, better fencing would allow us to move more cattle in for grazing and create a more effective rotational grazing system.

Since taking over the contract farm in 2010 they had to boost their numbers by supplying cattle from their home farm so are now keen to improve their own numbers again and build up the Boreland of Girthon

"We have moved away from fattening cattle to producing heifers as we want to keep building up and improving the herd." said Neil Austin.

Yes it's time consuming but what a craic everyone has at shows, why not give it a go and see!





### **LEDWYCHE SALERS**



Seven years into a 10 year plan to breed a three-way cross suckler cow based on the maternal traits of Salers and out-crossed to fast growing, feed efficient Aberdeen Angus and Simmental bloodlines, James & Emma Hallett's first crossbreds are performing well but lessons have already been learnt.

Having recently achieved the goal of establishing a 100-cow pedigree Salers herd at Lower Wood Farm, near Ludlow, Shropshire, the first three-way cross calves should be born in March 2020. The aim is to offer these, as well as full pedigree stock, for sale as bulling heifers to suckler herds either direct off farm and through Society sales at nearby Welshpool.

He says: "We believe the maternal attributes of the Salers mixed with the growth rates and carcase conformation of the two out-cross sires will produce great feed efficiency and productivity. Whilst there is not yet an EBV for feed efficiency, we believe Salers do perform exceptionally well."

Foundation stock for Ledwyche Salers consisted of 19 nucleus cows purchased from the Coland herd in 2010. Preenbank Izac has been a major influence on the herd, with in excess of 60 daughters now recorded, he has become the No.1 Salers bull in UK for milk - with an Estimated Breeding Value (EBV) +24, as well as growth EBVs in top 5% of the breed.

This year 25 heifers have been put to the polled Salers bull Rigel Kirsch; others have been put to the home-bred young bull Ledwyche Llewellyn, Simmental sire Alchester Francis Marshall 14 and Angus sire Cordon Jester P255. All have been selected with an eye to traits for milk production, calving ease, growth rates and temperament.



"This was always going to be a 10 year programme of breeding and investment," explained Mr Hallett who formerly worked for genetics supplier Cogent and today has additional business interests in the marketing of livestock.

Cows are housed from November as ground conditions dictate and calve in March the following year. Females and their calves will be turned out 72 hours after calving onto pasture at Lower Wood Farm which covers 93ha (230ac) on the Wiggins family's Downton Hall estate.

Around 80% of the rolling clay-based grassland has been reseeded using perennial ryegrass and red clover mixes from research institute IBERs to form four or five year leys. Some is cut to produce large baled haylage which forms the foundation of the herd's winter feedstock.

Youngstock and heifers receive up to 4kg/head/day of an 18% proprietary concentrate during the housing period to ensure they achieve their growth potential and maintain body condition. "We're aiming for a 550-600kg mature bodyweight. If achieved it will be a reduction on current mature weights of around 10% allowing more cows to be kept on the same area."

Performance of all stock is recorded on the software programme Breed Plan including that of the first generation cross-breds. Youngstock are weighed every other month and breeding females twice yearly to monitor performance. "It is a very good farm management tool," reflects Mr Hallett who has an eye for interrogating data to make informed business decisions.





The data has already been put to use. For example, average birth weights from this year's calvings show Salers female calves averaged 37kg and males 43kg; Angus crossbreds 36kg and 44kg, respectively; and Simmental cross-breds 41kg and 47kg, respectively. "As we want to avoid any calving issues no Salers maiden heifers will be put to the Simmental or Angus bulls."

Heterosis, or hybrid vigour, should yield an improvement in performance of around 20%, he explains. Around 14% will be achieved in the first out-cross and the remaining in the second generation. "While the majority of bull calves are sold off the farm to a dedicated finisher I still keep an eye on their performance as an indicator against which to judge our breeding decisions."

More number crunching is helping fine-tune the commercial suckler enterprise's management. But an eye is also being kept on costs. Mr Hallett estimates it has cost in excess of £250,000 to date to establish facilities (open-sided straw housing for over-wintering stock) and get stock numbers to their current level.

"It would not have been possible had we not had capital available from careers we've had or continue to have away from the farm," he reflects. But the drive is for the commercial enterprise to be generating sustainable profits in order to reinvest and grow.

Some costs are offset such as swapping muck for straw with the estate's in-hand farming operation. Machinery costs are minimised by utilising local contractors for forage harvesting and reseeding.

But, fundamentally, Mr Hallett sees the beef sector needing to improve efficiencies across the board. Of all the livestock sectors it is one of the most fragmented, he suggests, not just in terms of the variation in breeds but also the diversity of farming systems in use.

"Some integration may be possible and I believe that we have to follow the progress made in the pig and poultry sectors at managing costs. Some of my obsession with data comes from involvement in horticulture where production and cost control are managed very tightly to generate profits."

"I believe Salers has the maternal



attributes of a very successful suckler cow - milkiness, calving ease - and when crossed with other commercial beef breeds can produce a calf that will perform, achieve a high 400 day weight and with good feed efficiency."

#### SALERS CATTLE SOCIETY PRE-SALE CHECKLIST – PEDIGREE ENTRIES

- Closing Dates: Check the closing date for entries with the Auctioneers or the Society website, and ensure all documentation is provided as per the entry form. Late entries or entries with incomplete documentation may be rejected to avoid delaying production of the sale catalogue.
- Tagging: Ensure animals are double tagged in accordance with current EU legislation.
- Herd Health: Ensure all animals meet the requirements of the Salers Society Herd Health regulations and submit a Salers Society Herd Health Declaration for each sale. In addition, you should submit an Owners Declaration of Health Status listing the ear tags of your entries using the form provided by your CHeCS scheme. Be aware that entries of animals not born in your herd may need a separate health certificate depending on the health status of their herd of origin. You will be required to display your CHeCS Herd Health Certificate, or a Health Declaration Pen Card for each animal, supplied by the CHeCs Approved Health Scheme of which you are required to be a member.
- Herd Health Requirements: All cattle pedigree and commercial entered for official Society sales must satisfy the following.
- **BVD Accredited herd:** Entries must be vaccinated with an approved vaccine no more than 12 months prior to the date of sale.
- BVD not accredited herd: The individual animals which have entered must be tested free of BVD virus and vaccinated at least two weeks prior to the sale date. Females that are sold in-calf or running with the bull must be from a BVD accredited herd or individually tested before service. with the BVD status of the bull being determined before he serves any females that are to be sold.
- Johnes: All entries to Society sales must come from herds which have entered into a CHeCs Approved or comparable Health Scheme and have a degree of risk classification for the disease. (www.checs. co.uk)
- Beta-mannosidosis: All Fullblood and Purebred animals must have a non-carrier DNA status for betamannosidosis.

- TB: All entries must comply with current TB pre-movement testing requirements. Cattle coming to Scotland from 1 or 2 year TB testing areas must have passed a TB test within the previous 60 days of the movement. This applies to all cattle over 6 weeks of age. Animals staying in Scotland must pass a post movement TB test carried out between 60 and 120 days following the movement. The current TB test cannot be carried out twice with 42 days or false results may occur. Proof of testing will have to be provided by yourself and dates of testing announced.
- DNA: All bulls sold at a society sale must be DNA profiled prior to entry of the sale. Test kits are available via the society
- Eyes: The veterinary surgeon may examine the animal's eyes to ensure that the retinas and lenses are sound. The vet retains the right to reject an animal for eye defects.
- **Dentition:** The veterinary surgeon will check the dentition is correct and the incisor teeth are biting on the upper pad. Animals will be rejected from the sale if the vet determines that their bite is severely overshot or undershot.
- Scrotal Size: All bulls will have their testicles examined by a vet. Testicles should be firm and even sized. Bulls deemed by the vet to have defective testicles will be rejected from the sale. The circumference at the widest part of the scrotum will be measured and should be 32cms at 12 months of age, 34cms at 18 months of age and 36cms at 24 months of age. The measured scrotal circumference will be displayed on the pen, and the Society may require the Auctioneer to announce in the ring that a bull does notmeet our standards.
- Teats: All female animals will be put through the crush and have their udders/ teats examined for defects by the vet. They may be rejected from the sale if significant defects are found
- Diseases etc: Check the animals are free from warts (pay particular attention to the sheath and scrotal areas), Ringworm, Mange, Lice or other contagious diseases.

- **Treatments:** If your entries are showing signs of any of the above conditions and have been treated then a signed veterinary certificate to that effect must accompany your
- **Locomotion:** Check the animal's feet and legs are sound and the general locomotion is satisfactory. The animal may be rejected from the sale if the Society Inspector determines that it is defective in its legs, feet or locomotion. Where possible, allowance will be made for animals that have had a long journey time to the mart.
- **Docility:** All entries are to be halter trained and led using bull ring, or nose clip/bulldog for females. The animal may be rejected from the sale if the Society Inspector determines that it is displaying unruly behaviour.
- Conformation and Condition: Check the animals are of good conformation and in good condition and meet the minimum weight for age standard as per the Society rulings. The measured weight for bulls will be displayed on the pen, and the Society may require the Auctioneer to announce in the ring that a bull does not meet our standards.
- **Declarations:** If semen has been taken from a bull, this must be declared for inclusion in the catalogue, along with the number of straws retained. If females have been flushed, this must be declared for inclusion in the catalogue, along with the number of embryos retained. If females are in-calf by AI, this must be declared in the catalogue and AI certificates must be provided.

Following arrival at the sale premises all pedigree cattle are subject to an official inspection conducted by a veterinary surgeon and a Society Inspector.

The aim of the inspection is to ensure that all animals sold at sales are of a consistently high quality and are free from any health and/or structural defects.

To avoid the disappointment of having cattle rejected, members should carry out checks before consigning Salers cattle to Society sales.

# BREED HISTORY and CHARACTERISTICS

#### **BREED ORIGIN AND HISTORY**

Salers (pronounced Sa'lairs) originate in the Southern half of the Massif Central in the Auvergne region of France. It has a rough and variable climate, and though higher, 2000-6000 ft, is very similar to our Lake District and the Highlands of Scotland and Wales. The Salers is one of the oldest breeds in the world, with prehistoric cave paintings suggesting that a similar type of animal has been bred in the area for 7-10,000 years.

They appear to be closely related to the old Celtic breeds and the African breeds, and were probably located in the Massif Central when red cattle migrated from Africa through the Iberian Peninsular and on into northern Europe and the British Isles.

#### **BREED IMPROVEMENT**

What is certain is that Devons, Durhams, (Shorthorns) and West Highland cattle were imported into the Salers area in the mid 19th Century with the intention of improving the breed. At the same time a M. Tyssandier D'Escous challenged the introduction of outside blood and set about improving the Salers by selecting from within the breed.

His method was considered most successful, and he became known as the Father of the Breed. A statue honouring his work stands in the middle of the small mediaeval town of Salers from which the breed takes its name.

From that time until well into the 20th century the breed was improved and developed as a triple purpose animal, Milk-Meat-Draught.

Traditionally, this involved the simultaneous production of milk for cheese and a calf for beef production. In 1925 milk recording became compulsory and weight recording started in 1962.

Resulting from all this improvement and recording has emerged the ideal suckler cow with bred-in foraging ability, able to utilise and thrive on native grasses and forage both summer and winter.

#### **BREED CHARACTERISTICS AND QUALITIES**

The difficult environmental conditions where the Salers breed developed makes it ideal for the poorer areas of the British Isles and today's beef industry. Salers are usually horned with a dark red coat, though there have always been some with black coats. Polled Salers were once very rare. Since the mid '90s, the availability of polled and/or black fullblood Salers has increased due to the efforts of UK breeders. The skin and pigmented membranes are brown and consequently few eye or udder problems occur. A good hair coat which becomes thick and curly in winter gives hardiness and adaptability to cold and heat.

Having roamed the mountains for centuries, and been draught animals they have developed strong legs and good feet with black hooves. Consequently the cattle can travel long distance over rough ground without developing foot problems. They are equally able to tolerate long periods inside on slats etc. Being one of the oldest and genetically most pure of the European breeds,

the Salers produces a positive effect on the predictability in crossbreeding programmes in a consistent increase in hybrid vigour.

The French National Institute of Agricultural Research has run trials that show that Salers cows and heifers are able to draw on their body reserves when food is scarce to produce sufficient milk for their calf, building them up again quickly when grazing is plentiful. The same trials show that Salers are only fully mature at 5 to 6 years of age.

#### **MATERNAL INFLUENCE**

Fixed through its heritage the Salers female displays exceptional maternal qualities of fertility, milking ability, calving ease, hardiness and longevity. High percentage calf crops resulting from the inherent fertility of Salers are realised through early puberty, quick rebreeding and high conception rates coupled with the breeds predictable calving ease and large pelvic structure. Further maternal advantage is realised through the Salers ability to wean a heavy calf and take care of herself. More kilograms at weaning result from the combination of good lactation and lean growth factors.

Suckler cow herd costs are minimised though the breeds foraging ability, winter hardiness and minimal feet, eye and udder problems. Salers are known for their longevity and "wearability" no doubt due to many of the factors stated, stress free calving, good feet

In a survey carried out in France, of over 100,000 Salers cows, 25.1% were 10 years old or over and the calving interval was 374 days.

Bulls are known for their ability to cover large numbers of females and in the ranching countries bull numbers have been halved and calving percentages have risen, another valuable saving on herd costs.

Salers are a unique breed that combine high carcass quality and fast growth rate yet calve

More live calves per cow put to the bull means more £££'s and it all begins with a trouble free birth. Vigorous calves born with moderate birth weights and slender long foetal conformation have gained Salers a proven reputation for easy calving. Salers sired calves offer the cowman the unique combination of increased weaning weights with less management at calving.

The dam and the sire both influence the weight and shape of the calf at birth. Salers

calves are relatively light at birth, about 36 Kg for heifers and 38 Kg for bulls, they are also long and rather flat in shape, it is this feature which makes the Salers bull very popular for crossing with commercial and dairy heifers.

The Salers influence contributes a large pelvic area to cross bred replacement females and will allow commercial suckler cowmen to utilise heavily muscled terminal sires in a cross breeding programme with less concern about calving difficulties.

#### **FEEDING AND CARCASS**

The final measurement of a breeds capabilities is the economic production of a lean, nutritious and palatable protein product. That is what beef production is all about, Salers consistently produce the product that the industry and consumer demand. Salers and their crosses are being proven both by the feeder and the butcher.

Competitive live weight gains and efficient feed conversion have been documented by the feeder, whilst the butcher appreciates carcasses that are of industry acceptable weight from approximately 10-16 months and producing top grades. Salers cattle are extremely flexible in the finishing yard enabling feeders to make the best of the markets highs and lows.

The Salers is a carcass breed that calves easily and consistently produces carcasses that are high in quality and lean in composition. Salers are producing an industry preferred product that is making the breeder, the feeder, the butcher, and the retailer take notice.

#### THE BEGINNINGS OF SALERS IN THE U.K.

In the spring of 1984, a herd of Salers was founded in Cumbria - 60 females and 4 bulls with as wide a genetic base as possible. Consequently, heifers by 45 different sires and 4 bulls completely unrelated to each other were imported into the U.K. from France.

All the cattle were first choices. Growth rate, docility, femininity, straight top lines and correct legs were the main criteria for selection. All dams, and granddams where possible, were inspected and had to come up to the same standard. In that importation were two females carrying the poll factor. All lived up to expectations, bred and gave no calving problems whatsoever.

From the original importation Salers cattle quickly spread all over the British Isles from the Shetlands to Cornwall and Ireland. The Salers Cattle Society of the U.K. was formed by Bryan Walling, Robert Hudson, Fiona Walling, Thomas Dobson and Bruce Worsley of Crosthwaite,

The first AGM was held in November 1986, at that point there were a mere 10 members. Bryan Walling was elected as first Chairman.

Since then the breed has continued to expand throughout 1000 Salers are being registered annually by 175 members.

The Society is divided into Areas and is governed by a Council made up from the Area Representatives.

#### **USEFUL SOCIETY INFORMATION**

ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTION: Subscriptions are due and payable on 1st January each year. No invoice will be sent so it would be helpful if all members would please pay promptly. V.A.T. receipts will be sent on payment. Payment can be made by Standing Order.

**REGISTRATIONS:** Though equivalent in all other respects, the Herd Book maintains a permanent distinction between Full Blood pedigree animals with ancestry 100% traceable to French origin, and Purebred pedigree animals resulting from a grading up program. The registered name of Purebred animals will be followed by (PB). Progeny of a Purebred sire or dam can never be designated as Full Blood.

The poll/horn status is to be recorded as part of the registration. The poll/horn status can be amended if required and a new warranty issued. Up to the age of 12 months of age this is free of charge, and thereafter the normal fee for a replacement warranty applies. Polled animals must include either Poll or Polled in the name.

No calves can be registered unless they are confirmed as being noncarriers for beta-mannosidosis, either by parentage or testing (copy of test results to be supplied).

No calves can be registered unless the sire has been DNA tested and the result lodged with the society; hair sample kits are available from the society office.

To register a calf got by embryo transplant, the Embryo Registration Form No. and Embryo Number (e.g. 186/3) need to be supplied, and its registered name will be followed by ET.

#### A.I. CERTIFICATES MUST ACCOMPANY REGISTRATIONS IF

APPROPRIATE: Registrations cannot be accepted without A.I. Forms (if appropriate). Remember to note on the Registration Form if the calf is polled. Some semen owners use the Sire Certificate system. Do check when buying semen and remember to forward the Sire Certificate with the A.I. Certificate and Registration Form.

THE GRADE REGISTER: Grade A, B and C females will be registered in the Grade Register. Only Full Blood bulls can be used in a grading up program. Though not recommended, a Purebred bull (31/32 or greater) may be used on a Grade C female and her heifer calf be registered as a Grade C.

Following its first calving, a Grade C cow may be designated as Purebred and transferred to the Herd Book, subject to passing an inspection for conformity to Breed Standard and being tested noncarrier for beta-mannosidosis. Application for inspection must be made in writing to the Secretary. On passing the inspection, to effect the transfer the original warranty and transfer fee must be forwarded to the Secretary. This cow's calves can then be registered as Purebred according to the table. Grade C cows are transferred as 7/8 PB no matter what % Salers blood they actually are.

**UK HERD BOOK NUMBER:** The herd book number is now the UK tag number as the unique identification of each animal.

IMPORTATION OF CATTLE: As requirements of importation change CHECK WITH THE SECRETARY what is required when you start on the import of animals, semen

or embryos. All imports must have a three generation pedigree certificate issued by the Society of the country of origin and a clear DNA Beta-mannosidosis test certificate **Imported in calf cattle must** also have an official three generation pedigree certificate and a clear DNA Beta-mannosidosis test certificate for the sire of the invitro calf. Registration of imported cattle (not in calf) is £42+VAT, if registered within 3 months of import. For imported cattle, with an in vitro calf, registration is £64.50 + VAT, if registered within 3 months of

Over 3 months late penalties will be incurred.

#### SIRE CERTIFICATES:

A system has been set up for registering calves got by a non-owned sire. Service may either be by A.I. or natural. In these cases a Sire Certificate must be obtained from the owner of the bull/semen and forwarded with the registration form (and A.I. form if appropriate). The cost of the Sire Certificate is negotiable privately between

the owners of the dam and the owners of the bull or semen. Sire certificates can be obtained from the secretary at the cost of £30 per 10 certificates. The secretary must be informed if the owner of a bull or semen wishes to use the sire certificate system (otherwise registrations may be accepted without a sire certificate and the owner would lose the service fee).

EMBRYO TRANSPLANT PROGRAMME: Before embarking on an embryo transplant programme, please contact the secretary who will forward the relevant Salers Society forms. Minimum of £11 per animal flushed (up to 10 embryos) thereafter £1 per embryo. After 3 months minimum of £20 per animal flushed (up to 10 embryos) thereafter £2 per embryo. Remember to insert the ET Form No. and Embryo No. on the Calf Registration Form). £28 per Export Certificate plus

embryo registration. One Export Certificate covers all embryos from one flush to the same purchaser. BOTH SIRE AND DAM IN AN EMBRYO PROGRAMME MUST BE BLOOD-TYPED and have a clear DNA Beta-Mannosidosis test certificate.

#### TRANSFER OF OWNERSHIP:

A fee of £6 + VAT is charged for transfer of ownership. The fee is payable by the purchaser who should obtain the warranty from the seller and forward it to the secretary for transfer.

### **Pedigree Registration Royalty Scheme for AI Sires**

#### INVOLVEMENT OF THE SOCIETY:

The Salers Society of the UK and its secretary will merely be the tools by which those calves gain their registration, in a Pedigree Registration Royalty Scheme, which is an arrangement between the vendor of the semen and the breeder who wishes to register a calf, which is the result of using this semen.
