

At the Royal Highland show our champion came from Johny Wright who was showing for the first time. Well done!!

We have just seen a dispersal at Castle Douglas of 245 Salers cross cows with charolais and salers calves at foot . It was attended by buyers from all over the UK. Many went home without making a purchase which bodes well for our Society sale there in November.

A farmer in Shetland sold 11 charolais cross steers and 11 Salers cross steers at Thainstone in August. These were all home bred. He noted that the Salers crosses averaged 50 kg heavier than the Charolais ones. So long as we can produce Salers females that can calve to thick Charolais bulls we will continue to have a market.

After Castle Douglas in November our excellent secretary, Sian will be moving on to an exciting new opportunity with the Charolais cattle society. During her time with us I am sure you will agree with me that she has done a fantastic job covering all shows and events etc. and we all wish her every success in her new job.

### VICE CHAIRMAN REPORT 2023

With beef prices hitting new heights it is starting to look more positive towards the future. But there is always caution as there is uncertainty in the farming industry with concerns about leaving the EU, the end of the single farm payments and more emphasis on environmental schemes and being carbon neutral. This causes many challenges within the industry for the years ahead.

I feel that the Salers cow will continue to thrive in the future, being an easy calving cow that will rear a good calf on milk and natural pasture. While we all know what the Salers cow can do, I do feel that we forget that the Salers is not only just a maternal breed. We have seen results from many members where male calves are finished on a bull beef system reaching 400kg dead weight and U3 classification in under 16 months easily and match continental breeds. This without calving problems and the ability to keep females as replacement and running a closed herd reducing the health risk in buying in replacements.

Again, this year we had a great turn out in the shows around the country, starting at the Balmoral show in Northen Ireland where John Elliott came out on top with his cow Drumlegagh Monique. It was also a show to remember on a debut for the Wright family, Traboyack Salers in the Royal Highland show with Lisnamaul Rebecca being placed overall champion. On to the Yorkshire show and again an excellent turnout with over

30 animals on show, coming out on top was Bacardi Matilda by Roy & Adam Crockett. While numbers were down in Royal Welsh show Gwawr Griffiths has a show to remember taking overall champion with Felin Mona and also taking reserve champion and junior champion. Well done to all exhibitors for all their hard work and time taken to show these animals and promote the breed not



only in the major shows but also your local shows.

We had an excellent open day in the Scottish Borders where we visited the Kaimburn, Jedforest, Bacardi, Cleuchhead and Cumbrian herds. We saw some excellent pedigree and commercial herds and showed the quality, docility and versatility of the breed.

As we look forward to 2024, I can only see the breed continuing to move forward, with farmers having to be more efficient, they will have to look at many factors like the farms carbon footprint and antibiotic use.

I would like to thank Siân for her hard work and commitment during the last few years she has been with us and wish her all the best in the future with her new role. Also, to Andrew Sleigh and the whole council for their hard work during the year.

The continued fall in suckler cow numbers remains the main concern for the industry. Recent data released from BCMS shows that suckler born registrations have fallen again this year and there have been higher reductions in the registration of some of the main continental breeds.

Rather than look upon this as a 'doom and gloom' situation, this may signify an opportunity for the Salers breed and the Society. It may well provide the stimulation to investigate new ways of collecting, analysing, and using data, to validate the finishing capability of pure Salers. It may also provide an opening to demonstrate the immense versatility of Salers to complement any breed and perhaps forthcoming visits and initiatives could focus on joint ventures with those Societies that have shown an increase in registrations and demand. Either way, of all the breeds there is no doubt that the Salers unrivalled calving ease and exceptional maternal traits will ensure they play a significant role in the suckler industry of the future.






### INTRODUCTION TO THE SOCIETY





### SALERS - THE ANSWER TO THE CHALLENGING CHANGES FACING UK SUCKLER FARMERS By Terence Pye

As has been reported here previously, the UK suckler herd is in decline. The reduction in 2023 is expected to be at twice the rate of recent years (-3.6% vs -1.5%). The UK is not self-sufficient in beef, so the shortfall in production from our suckler herd (currently mainly offset by increased beef sired calves from our dairy herd) will drive increased beef imports, leading to increased carbon emissions due to the transport/ food miles from countries that also may not have the same high environmental, animal welfare and food quality standards as the UK.

Why are suckler farmers quitting in droves? When asked, the responses include "very stressful at calving time", and "can't make money from suckler cows". These are symptoms of

the deep-rooted problem of suckler farmers sourcing replacements without putting calving ease as a priority (or even a consideration), leading to excess assisted/bad calvings, hence unsustainable losses of calves / increased geld cows. It is perhaps not surprising that per 100 heifers/cows put to the bull in the UK around only 84% wean a calf.

The silver lining is that the decline in sucklers is focussed on cows by terminal sire breeds, whilst there is growth in numbers of cows with stronger maternal traits. Based on data from BCMS, this chart shows the average change/year in numbers of suckler cows (top ten suckler dam breeds) from 2015 to 2022.

This evidence of a major move away from cows by terminal sire breeds indicates that some suckler farmers

long-lived cows that rear a strong commercial calf every year at the lowest cost.


are taking on board the importance of calving ease, where the Salers is unrivalled. Consequently, the Salers has moved up from 8th to 7th in the suckler cow breed league table, with 41000 suckler cows and increased market share to 3.7%.

There is an important message for Salers breeders here too. Regarding suckler cow genetics, shape/conformation are clearly losing the fight compared to performance and efficiency. We must keep our breeding objectives firmly fixed on the performance

traits that got the breed where it is now, namely low birth weight/calving ease, and the breeding of robust functional docile



It has been an interesting but also uneasy time for those working in the production of high quality suckled beef! Interesting because yes prices have for some time been heading in the right direction - but uneasy because that is not enough to offset rising energy, feed, plastic, staffing, etc costs!

Interesting because yes cull cows had for periods of time commanded a price that reflects their real value - but also slightly uneasy because this rise in value has not held up and as we go into the Autumn market we are looking to see whether those prices will come back to where they were last year. The better cull cow prices caused another sell off of suckler cows with in some cases whole herds going out with an overall reduction in suckled calf numbers estimated at over 5% as a result, if this continues it will become a concern for the stability of our industry going forward......but then there is likely to be an uplift in demand for replacements for some of those cows culled which will be an opportunity for Salers breeders - and there are good signs of that as breeder are reporting more enquiries from those looking for Salers bred replacements! It is interesting also to note that whilst most of the beef breeds are declining the Salers is not - a good sign for the future. However with continuing uncertainty around the support structure for UK farming and whilst we continue to wait for an indication from government that they are even slightly concerned about the nation's food/farming industry - which is quite simply a corner stone of our society - then it is perhaps understandable that for some it has become hard to justify the continued investment that our industry needs. This will remain the situation at least until the terms 'food security' and 'government policy for food produced in the UK' are being seriously addressed by our governments – as they should or rather as they must be.

No surprises then that whilst our industry has continued to battle through the somewhat difficult environment we are in, that our breed is still progressing in Area 1. We have a large number of professional suckler farmers across in the Central/Northern regions of Scotland and these make a strong customer base for us to promote the many important commercial advantages of the Salers breed into. Again through the year good work is being done by those who have managed to create time and have got out there successfully presenting great examples of the breed at the major and local shows and events, with Salers featuring strongly at:

- Stirling Show Roy and Adam Crockett's cow Bacardi Matilda - AOBB Champion and Reserve Interbreed - she also was Interbreed Champion at The Northumberland Show and overall Salers Champion at the Great Yorkshire
- Echt Show The McIntyres winning Champion and Reserve Salers with Corrichie Rudi and Corrichie Molly
- Banchory Show The McIntyres repeating their success at Echt winning Champion and Reserve Salers with Corrichie Rudi and Molly
- Gargunnock Show Reserve Champion Continental Rednock Diana
- Royal Highland Show Johny Wright & family Traboyack Salers winning the Female and Overall Salers Breed Champion on their first time at the Highland with the intermediate heifer Lisnamaul Rebecca – and the heifer Rednock Ukraine winning Junior Champion and Reserve Female Champion and Rednock Salvador took Junior male and Male Champion.
- Stars of the Future at Stirling is getting to be one of the biggest calf shows in Europe and Salers from Neil and Lewis Ralston, Tom and Ian Walling and Rednock dominating the AOBB section wining Junior Male Kaimburn Scoutingforgirls (heck of a name), Senior Female Cumbrian Nanou 257 Poll and Junior Female and Overall AOBB Champion Rednock Myla Poll.

We have also been busy promoting the breed with farm walks – the three breeder farm walk in the borders area was a terrific way to promote the breed showing great suckler and pedigree herds, together with Young Farmers events, which are always enjoyable, as well as technical days for farmers groups. This kind of practical demonstration of the breed is very powerful and can be exactly what is needed to give potential buyers the confidence to make that first move into Salers. Finally the Wright's success at the Royal Highland is a great example to all considering taking up showing, – it's the quality of the animal that counts, and there is no better way of promoting both the breed and your own herd, plus it's fun - I strongly recommend it.





Across the region bull and heifer sales have remained strong throughout the year. We have seen a rise in interest from dairy farmers wishing to use Salers bulls on heifers, to chase up after AI, as many are now looking for a vigorous, saleable beef calf which will calve easily without complications.

Several new breeders in the area have joined the Society during 2023, which is excellent news for the breed. Should any members wish to start showing cattle, please feel free to get in touch, as Society members across the region are keen to offer any help and advice which may be required.

There was an exceptional display of Salers cattle at the Great Yorkshire Show this year, all credit goes to the breeders who took time out of their busy schedules to show animals. Mr D. Murray Lyle (Strathallan Salers) judged the strong classes put forward. Bacardi Matilda was crowned female and overall champion (homebred by Roy & Adam Crockett). Stepping forward to receive the reserve overall champion sash was male champion Beeston Hall Neyo, from local breeders, S & R Hallos, Beeston Hall, Ripponden, Yorkshire. The overall junior championship title was given to Rednock Ukraine, as well as the junior female champion and reserve female champion rosettes (bred by Gill and Malcolm Pye). Ukraine will be forward at the Salers Cattle Society Premier Sale in Castle Douglas, November where she will be auctioned, and all proceeds will be donated to designated

charities in Ukraine. There was a lot of success for the young handlers too, Lewis Ralston (Jedforest Livestock) stood 5th in anstrong beef young handlers 15 to 16 year old class and Gwawr Griffiths (Parys Salers) was 2nd in the 17 to 20 year old class.

For 2024, we will be organising a farm walk in January across two farms in the North of England, starting at Harperley Salers and finishing at Mickleton Mill Salers. The two farms are only 30 minutes apart and have different systems for wintering and fattening cattle, so will hopefully offer differing, interesting perspectives on the breed and how Salers can suit any system. 



Another year has passed, and this will be my last report as council member for Area 8, and Rebecca Jordan will be taking over in November if she is ratified at the AGM.

A mild dry winter made for an early turnout for our Salers in March followed by a damp spring but flaming June put things right for the young calves and silage making with the mini drought. Rain in July meant the grass grew and grew, and so did the Salers as the grazing platform was replenished, and silage stocks built up.

The point here is that as we have a changing climate, it is now that in beef production we need the benefit of a cattle breed that is adaptable to weather patterns and climate as it alters and becomes more unpredictable in the future. The Salers has that ability to cope with whatever the weather can do from hot and dry to cold and wet growing and thriving in all conditions.

Everyone wins with Salers. With cattle it is often difficult to decide when to sell, how long to keep. If I sell calves early, will I lose out to someone else. If I keep them too long, will they cost me too much keep, then profit becomes elusive. The farming colleges don't help with costings or margins over this and that, but they have not yet fully monetised the sustainability of production. There is even a big debate in Red Tractor about Green farm assurance.

Every farm has a monthly cost of operation. If you engage in a constant war on farm input costs as we do the famous 3 Fs Fertiliser Feed and Fuel, this can be 4Fs if you include Finance, keeping our on costs to an absolute minimum.

One simple rule we have developed is the  $\mathfrak L$  per month per calf of on farm yield. By dividing the age of an animal into

the market price you come up with a figure that the calf has earned per month whilst it has been on you farm. By doing this in the market you will come up with some horrendous figures that other people will produce like a 20-month-old store that has only earnt £25/ month on its farm, oh dear!

But if you sell 6-month-old Salers steers weighing 274 kg each and selling at £750 that's a whopping £125/ Month. Yes, you have the cow to pay for but with no fertilizer or feed costs and minimal fuel. After weaning the cow goes back outside until Christmas then the producers farm costs are minimised.

The grower then takes this animal to the pre finishing stage and both the grower and finisher are ably rewarded with a profit for their efforts. In the beef industry everyone has to make a bit otherwise the system doesn't work. But and most importantly it starts with a profitable calf every time. The Salers is that calf.

I would like to finish by thanking everyone in the Salers Council for their support and comradeship for the past fourteen years, especially Sian who is moving on to pastures new! She is the third Salers secretary that I have worked with on Council.

Lastly, we have many new members some I have spoken to but yet to meet, now that we are all free to travel about, it would be nice to restart our Area 8 dinner meetings to get new ideas and plan the way forwards with our Salers.



Due to dwindling livestock markets in this area cattle are having to travel further every year for sales but are still making market reports and topping the trade regularly, this should be positive for selling the benefits of the breed further afield.

Hopefully 2024 is the year the secrets of Salers becomes the breed everyone is talking about.



### RICHARD CUZENS BRUNYEE SALERS

### Richard Cuzens' family has farmed around Litton Cheney, near Dorchester, Dorset, for three generations.

When just 21-years old Richard acquired 28ha (70-acres) from his grandfather's executors. There, and on rented ground, he ran a commercial suckler and sheep enterprise up until 1986 at the time of the BSE outbreak. Thereafter he rented out the land while he went out to work in county show management.

However, in 2016, ill health forced him to retire from that line of work. He had retained the sheep enterprise but was keen to set up a suckler herd as well on the 28ha (70-acres) he owned alongside the 12ha (30-acres) of grass keep.

"I had spent nearly three years deciding which breed to choose," explains Richard. "I needed a breed which was both guiet and easy to manage because we don't live at the farm and I do not have the best health following a stroke. In the end it was narrowed down to Stabilisers, Beef Shorthorn and Salers.

"The Stabiliser organisation is very slick and efficient. Its promotional skills are excellent. Yes, a stabiliser is a very uniform beef animal but I was not 100% sure about the temperament. And it's not a pedigree animal; there's no interest in an individual animal's breeding – as there is with a pedigree breed. I needed that interest so I then started to look at the other two breeds.

"At the time I thought the Beed Shorthorn was too niche so I focused on Salers. I met Liz Wilde, then society secretary, who explained Salers are a maternal breed with easy calving. As we don't live on the farm that was obviously a huge bonus. I had heard the breed was 'wild'. Liz was honest enough to say there will always be an odd animal in a herd which isn't quiet but they should be culled if that is an issue. But that's the same for all breeds.'

With Richard's focus firmly on the Salers he then turned his attention to sourcing the correct breeding. For foundation heifers he travelled up to Terence and Jane Pye near Yarm in North Yorkshire and picked out five in-calf heifers which were due to calve at two- and two-and-a-half-years old to a polled Rigel bull.

"The heifers all had good breeding from great English or French blood lines," recalls Richard. "But we needed to see the heifers and their mothers to be sure of temperament," says Richard who has since successfully Al'ed these cows to Cumbrian Royale who was also polled.

As is always the case, it wasn't long before Richard had 14 cows in the herd – the size he was aiming for. But, at this point, he also realised there was not the demand for pedigree Salers heifers in the south of England, as compared with the north and Scotland. And he believed he would never succeed at producing breeders' bulls as he did not have the 'name'.

He was also struggling to sell the pure steer calves at a decent trade at Sedgemoor market. They were only realizing £800/head as buyers had yet to realise the breed's potential at finishing.

bred stock at Manor Farm are Covid-19.

At the same time, AI was no longer a feasible option. Richard therefore took heed of the French and, in 2020, bought in a Charolais bull. Home-

> resistant to red water, which is prevalent in the area, so Richard had to be very careful where he sourced a stock bull. Fortunately, the Seabarn Charolais herd, just outside Weymouth, is also in a red water zone so he did not have to travel far to secure a quality polled bull, Sea Barn Sebastian. When he purchased the original Rigel heifers he vaccinated against red water - this French-manufactured vaccine has been discontinued since



There have now been two calvings to Sea Barn Sebastian. "Every cow has calved without any assistance at all, including a heifer," says Richard who is delighted with the way they have grown on and achieved £1200 to £1300/head at Sedgemore when 13- to 14-months old.

Richard would ideally increase cow numbers but age and health will dictate whether that happens. "With the changes in trade policies, removal of subsidies and climate challenges, finding a way forward to be profitable and sustainable will be challenging," he believes. "As a successful enterprise, my herd isn't quite there yet but is definitely moving in the right direction.

"There is no doubt this breed is exceptional at calving. The fact we do not live where the cattle are and have no problems at this time speaks volumes. And because they calve so easily these cows get back in calf quickly which makes all the difference to the individual cow's calving index and how quickly the whole herd completes calving," he explains.

"The other wonderful trait of the Salers is their temperament. These cattle exude character; they are such gentle animals. They are all individuals but are happiest up on the dry chalk hill ground looking down into the village watching what is going on. After calving we love to see which cow is in charge of the nursery: it changes every day but there is always one cow left with the calves while the rest of the herd go off to graze.

"And on the lower part of the farm we have a lot of foot paths so have a lot of issues with dog walkers and visitors from

"Any heifers kept back as replacements we bred early (twoyear old) to keep down their size," explains Richard. "We outwinter until Christmas on rape and turnips using a bale grazing system where the fence is moved every day. Cattle have 5ha (12-acres) of grass as a back run.

"Compared with housing – which is expensive and takes me three hours every day – this system takes up just an hour a day moving the fence. Because of my health that makes all the difference. And this breed is hardy enough to cope with being out until then – even the cows and calves born in August.

"I have also invested in the French-made heavy duty Jourdain locking yolks – a great feeding system at housing. I am not as agile these days and using locking yolks when I'm bedding down by myself makes sure I don't get knocked by the cows who tend to get very playful in the fresh straw. My family insisted on this as I am often there alone."

Out wintered ground rotates into clover or herbal leys so poaching is not really a significant problem. Richard's rule for rotational grazing is cattle and sheep never return to the same field for 27 days. "However, that idea can go to pot in a drought or late autumn. Then we just pick up the fence and let the stock free range," admits Richard.

Going forward, Richard would like to flush his best cow, Rigel Martha Poll who, he believes, is the perfect polled Salers cow. She would be Al'ed to the best available polled Salers bull using sexed semen.

"That is one area I would like to see the Salers Society develop: A very clear register of which polled bulls are available for AI," suggests Richard.

"We need to know where these bulls are, their breeding and which AI company provides the straws – and if it is sexed semen. More and more farmers are working alone; using polled bulls removes the stress of dehorning as well as the associated labour costs. Creating a clearer register will go a long way to increasing the breed's appeal to more beef producers. This issue is just as challenging for other breeds," admits Richard who wished he had known about Salers back in the 1980s. By now he believes he would have bred a great herd.









### THEY SPIT OUT A CALF WHATEVER THE SIRE

THE Gregg family are passionate livestock farmers that have always enjoyed the show ring as a shop window for their stock, be it cattle, sheep, or pigs. And whilst British Blue cattle will always tug at the family's heart strings, it is the Saler's that have transformed their systems, made life easier, and yielded the margins.

Ernest Gregg, his wife Jean and family, farm around 90 acres of owned and rented ground just outside Randalstown, County Antrim. The farmhouse lies in view of Slemish Mountain, the central core of which, is an extinct volcano and the legendary first known Irish home of Saint Patrick. Some of the land is bordered by the river Bann, one of the longest rivers in Northern Ireland where the total length of the river, including its path through the 30 km long Lough Neagh is 159 km. Here Ernie and Jean spend their weekends checking cattle whilst watching the jet skis and leisure boats go by.

The farming enterprise is a real family affair involving daughter Rebecca who also works for Fane Valley as a sales support co-ordinator and daughter Naomi whose pedigree knowledge is almost encyclopaedic. Naomi was very much involved on the show circuit from a young age and her enthusiasm has obviously been passed down to her five-year-old daughter Perrie, and no doubt two-week-old daughter Ella, will also inherit the pedigree livestock gene and passion. The family have shown at Saintfield, Newry, Armagh and Castlewellan. In Castlewellan 2012, there was the biggest entry of British Blue cattle in Europe with over 70 cattle forward and Ernest and family achieved their most notable show result to date, being

crowned overall cattle champion with Ballybollen Grand Duke, and on the same day won the overall pig championship title. Never far from the limelight Ernie also provided a nine-year-old imported Salers Cow Joice, sired by Ecrin and out of Danoise, for the filming of the follow up series to Dungeons and Dragons, 'The North Man' which was filmed at Clandeboy Estate, Bangor.

Besides 18,000 chicks taken to point of lay at sixteen weeks, a contract-based system that was introduced eight or nine years ago to replace their broiler arrangement, the Gregg family also own and breed pigs which include Middle Whites, Gloucester Old Spots, Tamworth's, and Berkshire's. Ernie was Pig Convener of the Rare Breed Survival Trust (RBST) NI committee for four years until recently and has also branched out into sheep, purchasing Dorset sheep for granddaughter Perrie, which he puts to a Dutch Spotted and which are lambed back to a Beltex.

The poultry business provides the family with a cost-effective fertiliser that is applied to grassland in accordance with the Nutrients Action Programme (NAP) 2019-2022. In addition, three tonne of lime was applied last year to condition the soil and control the soil acidity by neutralising the effects of acids from nitrogen (N) fertiliser, slurry, and high rainfall. Other noticeable benefits from the application were an increase in earthworm activity and an improvement in the soil structure. Ernie said, "the lime has fairly cleaned up the grass".

Turning to the cattle operation, the Gregg's have fifty cows, twenty of which are pedigree Salers and they have just recently purchased a further six pedigree heifers from George McCall, Carrick View. The commercial cattle consist of Salers cross, Aubrac and Aubrac cross. Seamus Connell, Ballykeel first introduced Ernie to Salers, where he purchased two foundation females and a further two commercial Salers. A stock bull was bought whilst at an Area 4 club dinner in February 2016, George McCall who had Salers' daughters coming back to the imported bull Monanaleen Lolly, shook hands on the deal that night. Later that year in May 2016, Ernie showed Monanaleen Lolly at Balmoral Show and took first prize in the senior bull class. That same day the Gregg's also won the junior male champion title and reserve overall junior championship with Ballybollen Kyle, a February born son of Houblon.



Slowly, the British Blue cattle that had been resident on the County Antrim farm for nearly a decade were phased out and although they were much loved for their docility and shape, Ernie admitted they had become too expensive to keep and run. He whispered, "one night after a full shift driving, I performed five caesareans to deliver five embryo calves!".

At the time, he was affectionately teased by local neighbours and friends and recalls, "my friends kept asking me why I had changed [breed] and questioned whether I had lost my mind?". He said, "despite explaining the maternal virtues and ease of management of the Salers, over and over again, they couldn't understand why I had changed". But one day, this all stopped. Ernie said, "I forget the reason why, but a retired cattle dealer, used a Salers bull on his blue cows and just after calving time he phoned me to say, he couldn't believe it, when the cows had started showing signs of calving, he would run to the steading to get the 'jack' but by the time he had got back, the calf was out, so he would run to the house to defrost colostrum but by the time he had returned the calves were up and had sucked!". Ernie gave a knowing sigh, the move to Salers at Ballybollen was driven by the need for peace of mind. He worked nights as a lorry driver for McBurney's for seventeen years. He said, "with the Salers, I could go to work at night knowing that Jean wouldn't have any trouble at home". He added, "the Salers' were just so much easier to manage, they have great pelvic room, they spit out a calf whatever the sire and they have great confirmation and temperament".

At Ballybollen, the pedigree Salers are currently put to Glenocum Samson, a Ballykeel Magnum sired son out of an imported cow Molly, which was purchased privately, from Robert Alexander, Broughshane. The remaining cows are put to, two culard Charolais bulls, one of which was purchased from France and sourced by Kyle McCall. All cows are spring calved in March, April and May and the progeny is sold privately in September / October at six or seven months of age, to two completely different management systems, further demonstrating the versatility of the breed.

The Gregg's system is low input, cows are treated with a topical iodine, a multivitamin and Rotavec Corona pre-calving which helps protect the calf from diarrhoea caused by Rotavirus, Coronavirus and E. coli. Newborn calves receive iodine at



birth, calves are preventatively treated for pneumonia pre-sale and creep feed is only introduced at minimal levels, one month prior to sale, to prepare the calves for their new homes.

All heifers are bought by a repeat customer that lives locally; he finishes them on a very natural grass-based diet. They are sold in the live market at Kilrea 14 months later, at around 600Kgs and averaging £1800. Whereas all the bulls enter a local, adlib fattening system, and are sold at Ballymena live market at around 820kgs, averaging around £2420.

The herd participates in the Northern Ireland BVD eradication programme which began on 1st March 2016 but the biggest challenge the farm and family face is the constant fear of TB. Thankfully, the herd has just moved from a four-monthly testing interval to six-monthly testing interval, but TB is an ever-present worry and cost. But despite this threat and expense, it is evident that the desire, from the oldest generation down to the latest generation, to breed and show pedigree livestock remains significant and Ernie revealed that the only way that this will be possible given the economics of suckler farming today, is by ensuring the system at home is efficient and economical as possible. He said, "you can only achieve this level of efficiency by selecting a cost-effective cow, designed and dedicated to rearing a calf without intervention and for me the only cow up to the job is the Salers'!".

## SALERS CATTLE CROSSED WITH HEREFORD MAKE GREAT CATTLE! Written by Sian Sharp, Photo credit: Isla Campbell Photography



There are some that are born into farming and there are others that are born to farm, and it is the latter that applies to Paul Freeland-Cook, the son of a banker who was born and brought up in the west end of Newcastle. There is also a famous saying, 'all dreams can come true if we have the courage to pursue them', and the Freeland-Cook Farming enterprise is evidence of that. Paul, who started as a student and then later became a lecturer, working for Buccleuch Estates, now known as the Buccleuch Group, at Drumlanrig Estate, Dumfries. In 1982/83, Paul and his wife Angela made the calculated decision to sign a retirement lease from the Duke of Roxburgh and commenced farming at Cliftoncote Farm, in the Bowmont Valley, Yetholm, the home farm today.

The parents' courage and drive can be seen in their sons, Allistair, and Daniel and in turn their families, who now farm 5,500-acre across seven different sites, on a mix of farm business tenancies and contract farming agreements. The traditional retirement leases have been replaced, with five-year farm business agreements, which inevitably influence the Freeland-cook farming policies, systems, and investment plans. Farm diversification includes holiday lets offering walking and equine holidays and Daniel's wife Heather, looks after a holiday cottage in the village as well as taking care of their two children Poppy and Maisie.

Many of the seven farms are within a four-mile radius and Allistair, wife Claire and daughter Emma alongside trainee shepherd Duncan focus on the sheep operation consisting of 5,000 ewes. The hill sheep are hefted Blackface sheep, a maternal hill breed, selected for their strong mothering ability to rear lambs in extreme terrain. On the lower ground you will find Cheviot mules and Meatlinc crosses specifically bred to produce hardy, fast growing lambs of high carcase quality.

The family breed all their own replacements meaning the sheep flock and cattle herd are closed. Only breeding tups and stock bulls are introduced from high health herds under strict controls and quarantine procedures.

Daniel and his nephew Thomas take charge of the agricultural / groundworks contracting business as well as the 140 head suckler herd, consisting mainly of Salers and Salers cross Hereford cows. They crisscross the cows, using up to seven bulls which are either pure Salers or Hereford. Salers stock bulls have been purchased directly and indirectly from Cleuchhead, Drumaglea, and Cory and all Hereford bulls are either bred by or sourced by neighbour and friend, Rob Wilson, Cowbog. Daniel commented, "Hereford's were selected to be used over the Salers for their docility and fleshing ability and combined with the Salers milkiness and calving ability they make great cattle".

Seven bulls across 140 cows seemed excessive, but Daniel explains, "our land is spread out geographically, it has to be used according to suitability, whilst achieving maximum productivity and in order to ensure a tight calving period we keep the cows in small bulling groups". He added, "this also facilitates flexibility if needed, if we have a bull go lame, or one that isn't working properly, we can join two mobs together without compromising the health, condition and working ability of the other bull".

All cows are calved in an eight-week period, at the end of February, cows have access to high magnesium licks during risk periods and bulling heifers receive a mineral bolus prior to mating. Target body condition scores are between 2.5-3.00 and Daniel aims to maintain the body condition scores between calving and bulling, this is particularly important for those that calved at two years of age who are given access to the best grazing.

Cows and heifers are treated with SWISH for fly prevention in July and are PD'd in November alongside their annual booster vaccination for BVD. Bulling heifers receive their primary BVD course in March as well as a mineral bolus and wormer and are integrated into the annual BVD booster system with the cows





in November. Conception rates average 95% and this was confirmed by the latest veterinary results on the farm's health plan. Bull calves are tagged, castrated, and dehorned using paste within a couple of days of calving and all calves and their dams are turned out to grass within three days. The only other treatment administered routinely is Rispoval for calves in November and a pour-on wormer. This efficient, almost military like operation is low input, low cost and frees up space for lambing hoggs and ewes with triplets, as shed space is tight.

The Freeland-Cooks were one of the first in the area to introduce woodchip corals thirty years ago but legislation surrounding effluent discharge has changed and the ability to adapt the system to a stepped, reed bed system and comply on this land was not viable. Cattle are now bedded on straw within the corals and the system relies on a muck-for-straw arrangement whereby some local arable farmers bale their own straw which the family collects and in return they deliver muck back. This type of efficiency is evident in other areas where green crop collaborations are used to grow stubble turnips and short-term-levs over winter, providing feed and a cut of silage before pea crops are drilled in early May. They tend to sow Italian ryegrass in August almost as soon as the harvester has left the field because it grows fast, vigorously and is established quickly for use in October. It is a rent-free system, the Freeland-Cook's just cover the cost of seed and fertilizer and the arable farmers get the muck for free, the potential and convenience of the arrangement is massive with the only downside being the pressure to be out of the field by a set date.

All bull calves are sold in batches after weaning at around 10 to 12 months of age. They receive no creep feed at all, the Freeland-Cook policy across all units is to protect their most valuable commodity, grass so there is no room for poached ground. Therefore, bull calves are pushed harder after weaning with a fodder beet and a high protein silage diet to achieve around 500Kgs, a desirable weight for buyer Duncan Low, Aberdeenshire who pays a premium for well fleshed store cattle.

On a normal year, ten bottom-end heifers are sold as stores and a further twenty are selected to be sold as bulling heifers. Generally, forty females are put to the bull where twenty will be kept as breeding replacements and twenty will be sold as in-calf heifers. All breeding females are sold to repeat customers through Border Livestock Exchange. Daniel said, "we are exceptionally lucky, our cattle tend to be bought by the same people year on year, so we don't have to look for a market", he joked, "I haven't been to a market in years, in fact I haven't been off the place [farm] in years!".

This year, however, is not a normal year or perhaps it is a normal year for those who are having to make business decisions within these five-year arrangements. One of the farms consisting of 303ac (122.62ha), 193ac arable, 22ac woodland and 78ac of permanent pasture is up for sale and until that sale is agreed the family have no idea as to whether they will lose that land or be able to strike a deal to continue to farm it. Consequently, they have only bulled 20 heifers this year and whichever way the coin lands, there is no doubt that the family and the business have been impacted, in terms of management time, cost and emotional investment.

To manage a business of this scale within short-term parameters, the farm, family, and business must be well organized, resourceful, and economical and the Salers' play a major role. Prior to Salers Aberdeen Angus crosses were used but Daniel said, "their skin just didn't seem thick enough to cope with our harsh winters and high ground, the cattle were always looking to come in". He added, "we chose Salers for their hardiness as well as their temperament and ease of calving". Daniel explained, "we can't afford a huge amount of intervention here, the ground we cover in a day is vast and we need a breed that can take care of itself", he continued, "Salers are easy calving because of their big wide hips, they have a productive lactation, a good udder and raise the calves themselves, which is just what we need!".

As well as being economical, efficient, and easy calving, I asked Daniel to describe Salers, Daniel replied, "they are exciting, exuberant and of course, they look good!". The Freeland-Cook family manage thousands of rented acres from three different landlords with significant enthusiasm and vivacity. They achieve successful, dynamic, day-to-day working, family relationships with respect and energy as well as manage lucrative, cheerful, and harmonious collaborations with neighbours. Perhaps if anything or anyone should be described as 'exciting' and 'exuberant' it is them, but it is reassuring to know that the Salers' play a stimulating, motivating and pivotal role in their undeniably successful business.



# SALERS ARE HASSLE FREE, GIVE THEM GRASS AND LEAVE THEM BE! Written by Siân Sharp, Photograph credit: Isla Campbell Photography

James Tudor Francis-Jones aged 24 years old, a former Hartpury Agriculture College student, and recently appointed local Community Councillor, is the fifth generation to farm at Glyn Farm, Llanidloes. The 620-acre livestock farm is nestled along the Clywedog valley, Powys. The highest point on the farm contains a roman fort, and borders both the protected Bryntail lead mines, which illuminate a time when this tranquil spot was a bustling site of industry, as well as Llyn Clywedog a man-made reservoir formed by the construction of the Clywedog Dam. The dam was built between 1965-67 to regulate the flow of water in the Severn and is the tallest concrete mass dam in Britain standing 72m high.

James' objective for Glyn Farm is to, "keep it going, remain profitable, and continue my father's legacy". He said, "I want to build on, and grow what Dad, and the family before him started". James' father Tudor Francis-Jones was a real countryman, he enjoyed shooting and all outdoor pursuits, and he was also a keen rugby player, playing scrum half for his local town of Llanidloes, having gained a Welsh District Cap in 1998. Sadly, in November-2020 aged just 49 years old, he passed away, following an eight-year battle with ill health.

As James competently and skilfully fulfils his father's farming dreams, sister Maria is pursuing her sporting ambitions in the football world, and playing at present for Burnley, and represents Wales whilst attending university. Mum Angela is also actively involved in the farm, tending to all the accounts, whilst working part-time at the local Solicitors, and his Taid [grandfather] Hugh Jones, keeps an interest on how the farm is progressing.

Aside from a few minor diversification projects, such as a biomass boiler that runs two houses, and a wind turbine on the farm, the enterprise is typical of a conventional Welsh livestock form

The livestock at the Glyn Farm are in both schemes of the Farm Assured Welsh Livestock Beef and Lamb, and the cattle herd hold the gold status of Gwaredu BVD Certificate. Most of the cows are housed on cubicles, whilst the young stock is bedded on straw. Winter fodder includes 100-acres of pit silage, and around 300 - 400 round bales of silage. 10-13 acres of turnips are also grown to feed ewes, drilled in late summer, and then grazed in the winter, and put into wholecrop (peas and barley) the following spring, which produces 150 bales to feed young stock, it is then put back to grass in the autumn. James is very keen to invest in the farm's natural asset, grass, he said, "well-managed grass is the cheapest feed for sheep and cattle". He added, "reseeding can improve yield and quality whilst reducing the need for bought in feed". Thirteen acres has been reseeded this year using a cut once and graze, long term lay, 'Fortress' mix from Oliver seeds.

Improved grassland in most of the UK can grow over 12 t DM/ha, but the current average is around 7 t DM/ha. Research has shown that increasing the proportion of the farm reseeded each year increases the amount of grass grown and utilised, resulting in increased profitability. (Source: AHDB: Grassland reseeding)

There are around 100-acres of existing woodland, including hardwood and softwood, he said, "I am not a fan of planting trees which could be used as productive farmland!".

James utilises the remaining 520-acres of grassland for 800 Welsh mountain ewes, mules, and speckled faced sheep, to enable him to keep a closed flock, breeding his own replacements, and crossing a texel on a mule, which produces a quality butchers lamb.





75 Salers cows are run with two Charolais bulls, Ravensworth Rodney, November-2020 born, a Ravensworth Max son, purchased at Carlisle May-2022 sale. The second Charolais bull is named Carrowkeel Oliver, October-2018 born, a Cavelands Fenian son, from Ireland, sourced by Andrew Powell. The 25 pedigree Salers herd are registered under the Glynne Hall prefix. Glynne Hall derives from a mansion which was never built; however the current farmhouse is an earlymid 17th century Renaissance-style gatehouse to that very mansion.

The pedigree cows are put to the Salers bull, Approach Farm Reese, March-2021 born, a Seawell Lithium son, of Approach Farm Nutella. Approach Farm Reese stood as reserve senior champion, and reserve overall champion in the Welshpool Spring Show and Sale in May-2023.

75% of the cows are calved in spring in a tight six-week calving period, the remaining 25% cows calve down again in a six-week period from early September. Bull calves are castrated immediately, and all calves are de-horned. To remain profitable James revealed, "I need a 'decent' number of cows", he said, "I can honestly say that I have never pulled a calf since Dad died, in fact, in the last twelve months, 100 cows have calved, and I have only lost one calf, which was a twin bull calf that

was premature". James explained, "a lot of my friends have other breeds of cattle, but as far as I am concerned, they are time consuming and expensive, something I just cannot afford". He said, "I don't think I would keep cows if I didn't have Salers, I don't think I would be able to keep the same numbers with any other breed or achieve similar margins with anything else!".

Stabilisers have become more popular in Mid-Wales recently, but James revealed that they just weren't for him. A medium sized fleshy Salers cow is favoured above a rangy beast at Glyn Farm, cows must have good udders and feet, and a strict cull policy is employed for anything that doesn't meet requirements. He said, "I also like a compact, fleshy bull with a good top, and I am not a fan of the polled type, for me they just don't have enough character". He added, "there is no other breed that is as cost-effective as the Salers', a cow that can breed shapely calves by a Charolais bull, that are snapped up at the markets!".

The Francis-Jones family used to breed four to eight pedigree bulls each year, but the return on bulls was slow, keeping them until two years of age took up valuable housing. Now everything is sold as stores in the spring and autumn at Welshpool, allowing James to keep more cows. Store calves are fed with minimal creep one month prior to housing to ease the weaning process, and then continually increased to an adlib system, he uses a Bibby's blend which is supplied by Jamie Woosnam, Trefeglwys. Wholecrop bales are provided, to make a good weight at a young age. James also sells Salers heifers from home, depending on how many he has to spare.

At the 2023 spring store sale at Welshpool, James sold 22 Charolais cross Salers steers, at 10-12 months of age, at an average of 450 Kgs and £1429, two pure Salers steers at the same age, averaged 440 Kgs and £1180, and 12 Charolais cross Salers heifers at 10-12 months of age, averaged 401 Kgs and £1187. It is obvious that the system at the Glyn will not change dramatically, mainly because it has found the right product, and the right formula that is producing the right results. And while cows remain on those beautiful, lush, green valleys close to 'Llani' [Llanidloes], those cows will always be cost-effective, easy calving, low intervention Salers!


The family have a tremendous support network from local friends but even then, farming 620 acres, with over 800 sheep and 100 cows, is no easy feat. Many older farmers in the area reminisce of the 'good old days' before Covid-19, Brexit, and the increasing prices. James however looks at the situation differently, he said, "there is no doubt lockdown has changed things, for one, me and my friends never returned to young farmers but we [our generation] can't compare these times to days gone by, because we have never really known any different!".

The farm at the Glyn is traditional in its structure, but modern in its techniques, very much like the man that is running it now, a wise head, on young, optimistic, shoulders. Although modest and reserved, James has this underlying strength, and determination combined with a compelling energy which unveils a strong character running an undeniably prosperous business. This successful recipe and efficient business plan utilising Salers, and their heritable maternal traits will no doubt serve as an admirable legacy for generations to come.



### STRONG CLASSES OF SALERS AT 4 BREED CALF SHOW

### **Dungannon – November 2022**

Following the success of the first ever 4 Breed Calf Show last year, the Northern Ireland Salers Club once again joined forces with the NI Blonde Cattle Club, NI Blue Cattle Club, and the NI Simmental Cattle Breeders club at Dungannon Farmers Mart on Saturday 26th November 2022.

There was a mixture of experienced and young new breeders across all the breeds, and it was a pleasure to witness members helping, encouraging, and mentoring each other. The aim of the event was to provide a safe environment to bring out calves for the first time in the hope these cattle will return to the show circuit next year.

This event would not have been possible without the support of Trevor Wylie and the staff at Dungannon Farmers Mart, and the very generous sponsors HVS Animal Health, Ballygawley Vets and Centra Ballinderry.

There was fifteen young Salers, both male and female, aged between 9 September 2021 to 15 May 2022, representing the breed from six different exhibitors and in charge of the judging was Adam Crockett, Bacardi Salers, Scottish Borders.

Adam selected Drumlegagh Rogue as his senior champion, a Loyal sired September-2021 son out of Drumlegah Lexi from J & E A Elliott. Standing reserve to Rogue in the senior line-up was G. McCall's, first prize senior heifer Carrick View Rita by Orient and out of Carrick View Juliette, she was born in October-2021.

The junior champion was also from George McCall, Carrick View Shona won the first of the junior female classes and was born in March-2022, sired by Orient and out of Connemara Rhiona. Standing reserve junior champion was an ET calf, Ballykeel Sensational ET from Seamus and Christine Connell sired by Mathieu and out of Indiana she was also born in March-2022.

### GENTONS SWEEP THE BOARD AT WELSHPOOL

### **WELSHPOOL AUTUMN SHOW & SALE - THURSDAY 9TH NOVEMBER 2023**

The autumn show and sale of pedigree and commercial Salers, sponsored by Tithebarn Ltd and Caleb Roberts Insurance Services, took place at Welshpool on Thursday 9th November 2023.

The pre-sale judge was Mr Arfon Hughes, who first purchased two Salers heifers in November 1990 after being introduced to the breed by his good friend Mr Donald Gilder. In 1991 Arfon and his wife Siân visited Ann Owen of Banc Salers and bought a further two in-calf cows. These four females were the foundation of their herd. Arfon and Siân bought cattle in France as well as from breeders in the UK and went on to breed their own replacements being the first breeders of Salers in North Wales.

Arfon found his overall champion in Gentons Salvador from Mr Bertie Facon, Banbury. He was brought out on the day by Ben Bellew and his assistant Jake Pamplin and boasted impressive milk figures. Salvador was a January-2022 born son out of imported Ondee and by Murphy who stood champion at the National show in France in 2019.

Standing reserve overall champion was March-2022 born Seawell Signature from P.M. & S.M. Donger, Seawell Salers, Towcester. This Seawell pacific son, out of homebred Seawell Ripple possessed short gestation figures whilst featuring strong growth rates.

In third place, commanding the top price in the sale ring at 3,000gns was another lot from Mr Bertie Facon, this time Gentons Shere Khan born in February-2022, again by Murphy but out of imported cow Opale which sold to pedigree breeders, A D & P M Rogers, Coland Rise, Haverfordwest. Seawell Selector was placed fourth, a March-2022 Omarsy son out of Seawell Kama and fifth prize was awarded to Angus and Kerry Gowthorpe's Approach Farm Simba, a Seawell Lithium sired son out of Approach Farm Gemma.

Buyers were cautious but commercial Salers remained sought after with six commercial females selling to an average of £1563 and a top price of £2450 for an in-calf heifer from Mr Bertie Facon, Gentons Pedigree Livestock, which sold to pedigree breeder Andrew Powell, Knighton, Powys. This heifer beat last year's commercial sale leader by £550 and heads home alongside the top price commercial female from Angus and Kerry Gowthorpe at £1400. Bertie Facon won the Best Pen of Commercial Salers sponsored by Caleb-Roberts and Angus and Kerry Gowthorpe took the reserve spot. The second in-calf female heifer from Gentons made £1900 to D Andrew, Meifod, Powys and the final Gentons commercial lot sold for £1400 to W J Barnett & Son, Knighton Powys. A further two lots were forward from Angus & Kerry Gowthorpe, one sold to I W Roberts, Dolwyddelan, Conwy for £1180 and the next at £1050 to D Williams, Llandeilo, Carmarthenshire.

The Best Pen and Reserve Best Pen of Production females was also awarded to Bertie Facon, Gentons Pedigree Livestock. Pedigree Production females peaked at 1,900gns twice for Gentons Sienna and Gentons Stella both Murphy sired daughters who had been running with homozygous polled bull Gentons Sargent and were bought together by pedigree breeders R Evans & Son, Ebnal Lodge, Shropshire. New to the breed, G F E Beazley, Craven Arms, Shropshire purchased two Gentons lots, the first at 1,800gns was Gentons Saige, an in-calf Murphy sired daughter out of Pipette and the second at 1,750 gns for in-calf Gentons Saskia out of Gentons Oracle.



The seawell production draft reached 1,500 guineas for Inka sired, May-2021 born Seawell Saphir, she was bought by pedigree breeder Gwawr Griffiths for her Parys herd, based in Anglesey. Gwawr also purchased a second Seawell heifer, Seawell Teasel at 1,220gns. I W Roberts took home two Seawell heifers for 1,400gns and 1,380gns respectively, Seawell Tamalika born in March-2022 out of Seawell Kavita was sired by Omarsy, and Seawell Tourmaline a Seawell Leonardo daughter out of Seawell Noreen.



At the end of World War 2, Germany sought revenge on the Dutch who had not helped their war effort, by blockading Holland. The consequences were longest lived for babies which were conceived during the famine. The Dutch kept meticulous records, meaning babies were followed for the rest of their lives. In a family where the first sibling was conceived before and another conceived during the famine, but were then raised the same, the second sibling was generally more susceptible to ill health; obesity, high blood pressure, heart disease and schizophrenia. Whereas parents and other siblings went on to have reasonably 'normal' lives.

This shows nutrition and stress at point of conception has an influence throughout the offspring's entire life. This is the concept of 'Epigenetics' in practise.

The same is true when we consider bulling and by getting our management and nutrition right just before and throughout bulling, we can influence which performance genes are switched on and how this goes on to enhance overall lifetime performance of the subsequent calves.

According to the most up to date AHDB figures, 18% of suckler cows in the UK are not producing a calf each year.

Sometimes reality is difficult to face, however if we want to improve as an industry, we need to know the start point. We're being constantly reminded to 'increase efficiency' and 'reduce carbon footprint' to 'be more sustainable'. There can be confusion and jargon around sustainability, but surely the best thing we can do to improve the sustainability AND ultimately the profitability of our herds is to carry less passengers. More cows in calf, having a calf every year on their birthday and rearing calves with as little input as possible, is surely the ambition of most breeders? More live calves means more to show and more to sell, after all.

# BREEDING SALERS IN THE SCOTTISH BORDERS

KAIMBURN | JEDFOREST | BACARDI | CLEUCHHEAD | CUMBRIAN





On Saturday 26 August 2023, Tom Walling, recently retired Society President, organised a highly successful 'taster tour' of pedigree and commercial Salers in the Scottish Borders. It showcased the incredible versatility of this tremendous suckler breed in a variety of different management systems on extremely different farms and it also demonstrated the docility of the breed when presented with over seventy strangers who were able to get out of the trailers and walk amongst them.

The tour started at the Kaimburn herd of pedigree Salers owned by Mr and Mrs J A de Gier who trade as Edgerston Trading (2006) Ltd at Edgerston Home Farm, Jedburgh. The farm extended over 1,000 acres, with 600 acres of grazing and 400 acres of woodland. The Salers' were introduced to Edgerston Home Farm in 2014 with the initial purchase of eight commercial bulling heifers from the Aitken family at Carlopshill, Penicuik, eight commercial heifers from Roy and Adam Crockett, Bacardi Salers and twenty-four pedigree heifers from lan Livingstone at Carlisle. The first Salers bull, Seawell Highlander, was purchased privately from the Donger family, Seawell Salers. The following year a further twelve in-calf heifers were purchased, again from lan Livingstone and his Oaklands herd. Initially everything went to the Salers bull with the females being retained and the bulls kept entire and either sold for breeding or finished and sold as bull beef. Due to the increase in the cost of feeding bull beef, a Charolais bull was introduced to produce stores sold straight off their mother, reducing the amount of feeding required over the winter months. The herd currently consists of 100 cows, with 60 going to the Charolais bull and the remaining 40 going to the Salers bull to breed replacements, with the odd bull being kept for the pedigree market. The herd have enjoyed success at sales with Kaimburn Laser awarded reserve champion at Castle Douglas in 2017, Kaimburn Lewis was champion at Stirling Bull Sales, February 2018 and Kaimburn Playboy was champion at Castle Douglas in 2021. In 2017 the herd also entered the show ring for the first time at the Royal Highland and Great Yorkshire Show and the highlight came in 2022 where Kaimburn Precious was tapped out as breed champion by Glen Welsh at the Royal Highland Show.








Situated on the same farm was Jedforest Salers owned by Greg and Lewis Ralston. The Ralston boys have been brought up on a farm and farming life is all they have ever known. Greg's main interest has always been tractors and machinery whilst Lewis has always been interested in livestock, taking part in his first young handler class at the age of 6, showing a highland calf. Lewis' love for cattle and showing grew further when Roy and Adam Crockett asked him to show their Salers calf at the Royal Highland Show and Great Yorkshire Show for the first time in 2017. To encourage the boys further, in 2017 their parents bought each of them an in-calf heifer, Bacardi Katie and Bacardi Kerry, with the intention that they could start their own herd and show their own animals in the future, and this was the start of Jedforest Salers. Since then, the boys have enjoyed success in the show ring, Greg's first heifer calf, Jedforest Nightshade, was brought out by Greg in 2019 and was awarded junior female, overall female champion, and overall breed champion at the Great Yorkshire Show. 2022 was the first year that Lewis had something of his own to show and he won reserve junior female champion at the Royal Highland Show with Jedforest Roxy who then partnered him later in the week, in the young handler's competition where he was awarded the overall young handler championship title.





From Jedforest Salers the tour travelled six miles up the road to Mervinslaw, home to the commercial arm of Bacardi Salers owned by Roy and Adam Crockett. Their focus was on breeding cows which would rear Charolais calves with high weaning weights. There were 120 cows put to the Charolais bull with all the calves sold at 10 months old. Next stop was the Bacardi pedigree herd which was founded in 2011 and located at Gattonside Mains. The Crockett's started with twenty-two cows and calves three of which were pedigree. The Salers' were selected above other breed because at that time both Roy and Adam had full time jobs and they needed cattle that required minimum assistance. Within four years the Crockett's identified two families from the original cows, that had temperament problems when calving so they were eliminated from the herd. They adopt a strict cull policy on all undesirable traits and encourage others to do the same. The key success of the Bacardi pedigree herd was the purchase of the main herd sire Gulliver, a French import. He was selected whilst on a trip to France, after his dam Collette had been seen and who impressed the Crockett's very much. His breeding has exceeded all their expectations and Roy said, "his calves have great temperament, length, and big tops and that is what we feel Salers cows should look like!". Gulliver has sired many show winners and sale winners to date and is still going strong. The pedigree herd supplies the breeding females, the very best females go to the Salers bull which this year is Snoopy another French import. Adam said, "we are very excited to see what Snoopy will produce, like Gulliver he too has a very good dam". Other stock bulls that have been used were, Seawell Kitemark and Seamore Nitro, both of which have proven to have bred well. Most of the Bacardi bulls are sold privately, however Roy and Adam always support the Premier sale at Castle Douglas Premier sale on a yearly basis and have promoted the breed at both local and national shows and admitted they enjoyed doing it. Roy stated, "Bacardi's main aim for the future is to continue doing what we do and enjoy it in the process!".







The tour then headed to Lilliesleaf, home to the Livesey family and the Cleuchhead herd which was started in the late 1980's. The first Cleuchhead cattle were imported to the original family farm at Bonchester Bridge, Hawick to be crossed with the Galloway as well as a nucleus of pedigrees. Then gradually the herd transitioned towards Salers being fully pedigree since 2008. The Livesey family further developed their breeding programme with all the cows now residing at Broomhill Farm in Lanarkshire where lain and Sarah manage the calving herd and bulls and all remaining young stock are wintered and summered back at Nether Firth, Lilliesleaf under the management of Rob and Kath. The breeding policy for the Livesey's has concentrated on having correct cattle with good milking ability and fleshing qualities. They placed great emphasis on top lines, udders, feet, and legs. The herd now consists of 100 spring calving cows with all heifers calving at two years old. Females are bulled naturally and calve over an 8-week period with a firm focus on herd fertility. The Cleuchhead system concentrated on selling hi quality pedigree females at a range of ages from bulling heifers at the Premier sale, Castle Douglas, to some in calf heifers and 10-15 cows with calves at foot being sold privately off farm. Ten bulls are sold annually between the ages of one and two years of age and the remaining males are sold either as steers or some bull beef. Although the males are the byproduct of what the Livesey's are trying to do, they insisted that they must hit carcass specifications. Rob said," we are always looking for new genetics that fit our cow type, in recent years we have purchased bulls from Cuil, Bacardi, Essil, Darnford, Drumlegagh, Rigel, Whitebog and Poldean". The herd has also been influenced by French genetics from herds such as Fourtet, Gane, Trin, Vantal, and Manhes. No strange to success in the show and sale rings, Iain said, we have had a good run at Castle Douglas in the recent years selling bulls to both commercial buyers and some high-profile pedigree herds which is always satisfying".

The final stop was at Over Whitlaw Farm, Selkirk where Tom and Ian Walling run a herd of about 80 pedigree Salers cows and followers on 500 acres, with an additional 200 acres rented grazing. They also have a small herd of around 20 Shorthorns and a flock of 900 Lleyn ewes. The farm lies between 700' and 1000' above sea level, so the hardy, easy management Salers were the obvious breed to produce a low-cost good calf for both the pedigree and commercial markets. Calving takes place outside on the hill in May/early June and over the past two years there has not been one calving that needed assistance. As the ground can be wet, the cattle are housed in winter, with a recent investment being a slatted shed which can hold around 120 cows and calves. The cows are wintered on silage and minerals only, with the slurry being utilised on the land. Those bulls not destined for the pedigree market are fattened to 14 - 16 months and sold at 400 kg deadweight. Many of the cows' breeding lines can be traced back to the original Salers imported in 1985 by Tom and lan's father, Bryan, who also focussed on breeding a polled Salers line based on an original import from France. The stock bulls currently being used were Manor Lane Napoleon and the recently imported Sauveur from the herd of Alain Foretnegre. The Cumbrian herd is one of the few herds to export Salers back to France.

Alongside my studies I work a part time job in the local hospitals as a podiatrist assistant and the rest of my time I help on the farm at home. I also love to play Rugby and ride my horse Nancy in my spare time!

Farming has always been a massive part of my life as I have grown up around the farm. On our family farm I enjoy driving tractors to get the crops of silage in and carry cattle from farm to field. Whilst driving tractors is a big part of my farming life, I take a great pride in ensuring all animals are up to date with their

wormers and vaccinations such as the BVD vaccination which provides us with a BVD accreditation certificate. I have been brought up around not only the farm but also the agricultural shows such as the Royal Welsh show down in Builth wells. I have gone to the Royal Welsh ever since I can remember, the show is truly a highlight for me every year.

My aspiration to begin showing goes back 8 years ago. I remember watching the cattle in the ring at the show and I had an inspiration to start a herd of my own and start showing, this is when I turned to my Mum (anne) and Dad (John) and told them my big ideas. Off we went to find the right breed for me! After being in a few societies tents we strolled over to the very friendly Salers tent where we were welcomed with open arms and got told about the BEST breed going by Liz Wilde, the secretary of the society at time. I was given the 2016 salers journal and I went home to have a think about the next steps of starting my own herd.

I was on the yard one day with Dad dosing sheep when Mr Michael Thomas, a sales rep for cattle and sheep supplements came to introduce his sales, after a 'panad' (brew in Welsh) I told Mr Thomas about my idea of starting the herd and he knew just the place to go to find my first Salers cow. We went with Mr Thomas to Harri and Sioned Prichard's farm to see the herd of Felin Salers. The Felin salers were a treat to see and Harri asked if we wanted to purchase one of his cows with calf at foot, this is where my dad's brilliant eye for an animal came in handy! Harri agreed to sell the stunning cow and heifer to us and offered to have her in the yard the following week.

The following week we went back with the trailer to pick up Felin Elisha.M and her calf Felin Mona Mai. I knew exciting times were ahead!

After getting the cow and calf home the training began with Felin Mona Mai in preparation for the Anglesey Winter Fair. This was my first ever show where I fell in love with showing!

Moving along to the year of 2017, I entered the Royal Welsh show with Felin Mona Mai as a year-old heifer. Before the show had started, I had a tap on my shoulder by a pair of wonderful and kind people who today are very dear to me, Wilf, and Christine Burrows. Wilf offered his help to me and has done ever since this show and to him and Christine I offer my greatest thank you! I won second place in the year-old heifer class which means a great deal to me as this was my first 'big' show. Moving onto the Thursday of the Royal Welsh, Bryn Robinson, and I competed in the future female interbreed pairs with Felin Mona Mai and Preenbank Miss Emma, this was a moment to remember when we were tapped up from the line of all the cattle breeds into reserve champion female pairs, this was truly a moment to remember and a moment that will stick with me forever.

Unfortunately, due to the pandemic everybody was forced to stop showing. During COVID-19 I was in sixth form this is where I went and had experience on two dairy farms one of which was an organic Holstein dairy farm with a strip grazing system and the other was also an organic dairy farm with a rotary parlour and mixed dairy breeds. I enjoyed both experiences on both farms and it taught me a lot about the dairy side of agriculture.

After the pandemic when the shows reopened, I had entered Felin Mona Mai who is now a 5-year-old cow into the cow and calf section of the Salers classes. Only four weeks before, she had calved a female calf Parys Sweetie Pie; this was my first heifer calf under my own herd prefix [I cried when she was born with so much happiness]. A big thank you goes to Keith Jempson who let me use his heifers in the Young Handlers Pairs where we came overall champion with the Greens Park Salers. During this year I had bought 2 heifers one from Preenbank Salers and the other from Ashbury Salers. These two heifers with Felin Mona Mai were taken out to the local shows where we had great successes, and it was nice to get the Salers out there into the agriculture communities in Wales.

This year in Welshpool May sales, I bought another three Salers heifers all from the Luchabolsh Herd. Luchabolsh Guatemala has been shown alongside Preenbank Rosabella as I believe they are a brilliant pair, both heifers are extremely good heifers which have some serious potential to be brilliant cows. I have taken Felin Mona Mai with a calf at foot, Preenbank Rosabella, Luchabolsh Guatemala and Parys sweetie pie to most of the local shows and the Royal Welsh show where the cow with calf at foot came champion and Rosabella was reserve champion. Preenbank Rosabella and Parys Sweetie Pie accompanied me to the Great Yorkshire show where I was warmly welcomed by some wonderful Salers breeders with their brilliant stock. This is by far the best year I have had with my Salers, and it is an honour to own such lovely

My greatest success with Salers has been this year's Royal Welsh Show where my first show animal Felin Mona Mai had the champion cow and overall champion. We showed in the overall interbreed championship and this is something I aimed to do when I first bought the Salers and I have now achieved this dream.

stock of my own.



Today I own 14 Salers and they are cattle that I enjoy handling on the yard as they are a friendly breed who are very easy to handle

There are multiple factors that make a beef animal an 'ideal animal', I believe that each animal no matter what it is has good factors and lesser factors however, my 'ideal' animal would have good length from the shoulder to the tail setting with a good strong top line, an animal must have good depth in both the rib area and in the hind quarters, this means more meat on the animal which is what we essentially go for when we breed for beef. In a cow I would want a good pelvic width to allow for the easy calving along with a good strong frame and udder which will produce enough milk to rear a calf to the best standard.

As I have only been with the Salers for 6 years, I find it hard to comment on how I have personally seen the evolution of the breed, however, I have read up on the Salers and seen that they have been used for all sorts of reasons including milk and cheese production in France. The Salers' were transported over to the UK in 1984 and quickly distributed across the UK, the Salers then evolved more from a dairy breed into a beef and suckler breed and this has included breeding the good factors such as a bigger and stronger frame with more muscle mass in the body of the salers.

Around my area in Wales, I have seen an increase in the number of Salers around different farms which suggests that farmers are trying this breed in their farm which is ideal for building up the breed's name in the UK. The Charolais and the Salers have been seen to bring the "golden calf" which people have took a liking to, due to the weight and quality of animal, which is produced, and this is seen to be becoming a growing interest with many farmers.

Being free from myostatin is quite simply the reason why so many farmers buy Salers as it helps to protect and maintain the maternal traits of the breed to ensure the easy calving. My thoughts are that this is something that we as breeders will take pride in to ensure that we don't get the 'double muscle' which will increase the difficulty of calving, and to ensure this we DNA test the bulls and have DNA tested our foundation females to determine they are myostatin free and their progeny will be myostatin free by parentage. By testing we can ensure we keep the desirable genes and eliminate the chances of having the less desirable genes.

Although the Salers are obviously my favourite breed, the Charolais never fail to catch my eye. I like the cross with the Charolais and Salers as the offspring has a good weight and the potential to grow into large beef animal with the weight of meat and less waste of the carcass. I have previously turned the Limousin to a Salers cow and seen a very well-shaped animal which did very well as a prime beef animal in the market with  $\mathfrak{L}1.64$  to the kilo- not a bad price for an 18-month-old!

Over the 6 year I have been breeding salers my most favourite animal that I have bred is Parys Sweetie Pie. Sweetie is my first home bred heifer and she is my favourite (although we shouldn't have favourites). Sweetie makes me smile in the ring and it was such a pleasure to have her in the young heifer interbreed championship at the Royal Welsh Show and an honour to be placed 3rd in a big class at the Great Yorkshire show. She truly is my little Sweetie Pie.

My family have had the most influence on me during the whole process of starting a herd and beginning to show because each one of them have helped and aided me through all the easy and more difficult parts. My dad has helped me lot in the sense that he has helped me with funding for the Salers and given me a place to keep them, he and my mum have also gone to sales when I couldn't go due to university and placements. My mum on the other hand has helped with the movement of animals on and off holding and bought a lorry to cart the fleet of Parys Salers around the country. My brother has also been the biggest help when it has come to training and coming to shows to handle animals and take part in the action with me. Wilf and Christine Burrows who are like my family, have given me all their showing gear and all their knowledge which has guided me through many shows and given me so much more experience on how to show prep an animal. If it wasn't for my family, I wouldn't have made

it this far and I genuinely could not thank them enough and I am very grateful for everything they have done.

The best advice I have ever had was to always go out and have fun no matter the outcome of that situation- this was my mum's advice, and it is exactly what I have done throughout not only the cattle showing but everything I do in life. My dad also gave me good advice and that was to be proud of anything that belonged to me, which is important because we don't all have the same privileges and advantages in life therefore this advice taught me to be grateful for what I have even if someone else has something better.

My aims with the Salers are to continue increasing the herd into larger numbers and potentially replace the commercial cows-this will be so that we can breed from Salers as they are easy calving, allowing us to worry less about complications with a larger bull. I also aim to grow my herd and get some good showing potential animal so that I can continue to show at the bigger competitions and aim to reach the top!

My personal aim at the minute is to finish university with a degree and potentially do a master's degree in clinical management and work for the NHS as a podiatrist.

The Salers Cattle Society is a kind and understanding society. The members of the committee are so lovely and so willing to help, and I have always been welcomed into this society with open arms and I have always received the help that I needed. I feel that if you have any sort of question whether it is a good question or a daft question someone will always answer and help without any problems (Big thanks goes to Sian Sharp).

In the future, I would like to see the Salers Cattle Society organising events for the young breeders of the society and people who are new to the society and breed. I would like these events to contain information and teaching about the myostatin and the traits of the breed and perhaps team up with another cattle society so we can learn about other breeds as well. Showing wise, I would like to try and encourage people to take part in showing because at the end of the day we are all out there to have fun and we need more support at shows to keep them going.

The salers are the one breed you can truly depend and rely on for an efficient and effective suckler herd, they are purely and simply THE BEST!

# REBECCA REIGNS AT ROYAL HIGHLAND SHOW 2023

Mr Donald Gilder, Winchcombe, Gloucester, a fourth-generation farmer, who has spent a lifetime working with livestock and has been involved with the Salers breed since 1990, winning the RHS breed champion title himself in 1995 placed two-year-old, Lisnamaul Rebecca from Mr Johny Wright and family, Traboyack Salers, Ayrshire, as his female and overall champion. This was the first time the Wright family had exhibited at the show, and they were triumphant with this Nemo sired daughter out of Lisnamaul Molly, bought privately from County Down breeders, P J Maginn & Sons, who had shown Rebecca as a yearling and won the reserve junior female and reserve junior champion titles at Balmoral Show in 2022.

The reserve overall champion sash and best animal bred by exhibitor was presented to the junior male champion and male champion Rednock Salvador from Rednock Estate, brought out by Alfie McGregor. Salvador was a Baron sired son, born in March-2022 and out of homebred cow Rednock Peru. Rednock Estate were also triumphant in the female section winning junior female champion and reserve female champion, with March-2022 born Rednock Ukraine, sired by Rigel Officer, out of Rigel Odessa. She is destined for the Premier Sale at Castle Douglas Nov' 2023 where she will be auctioned for charity and all the proceeds will go to the people of Ukraine.

Standing as reserve junior female champion was Cumbrian Nanou 257 Poll, a Manor Lane Napoleon daughter out of imported dam Nanou, from the Walling family, Farmstock Genetics. Edgerston Trading (2006) Ltd brought out by Neil Ralston and family took the reserve junior male champion spot, then won the reserve junior championship before being awarded the reserve male championship rosette, with March-2022 born, Kaimburn Scoutingforgirls, sired by homebred Kaimburn Ole, out of Kaimburn Madonna.

The pairs competition was won by Bacardi Salers with a Gulliver son, Bacardi Shadrack and Seamore Nitro sired heifer, Bacardi Raquel. Edgerston Trading (2006) Ltd stood reserve with Kaimburn Scoutingforgirls and Kaimburn Rosie and the Ralston sons Greg and Lewis, who run Jedforest Livestock took 3rd place with Jedforest Shaggy and Jedforest Roxy. The best group of three was won by Traboyack Salers with Lisnamaul Rebecca, Lisnamaul Rascal and Traboyack Rooney.

On Saturday the Salers breed also claimed the fourth prize spot in the prestigious Interbreed Team Championship which was judged by Keith Redpath from Kelso. The four strong team consisted of Bacardi Matilda, Rednock Diana, Bacardi Raquel and Kaimburn Scoutingforgirls.

# MATILDA WALTZES TO THE TOP AT THE GREAT YORKSHIRE SHOW By Siân Sharp

The growing significance of the Salers breed in the suckler market, driven by their unrivalled maternal traits which results in a sustainable suckler with a focus on increased margins was matched only by the desire of the Salers breeders wishing to share their story, by exhibiting the breed potential, at the Great Yorkshire Show.

In charge of proceedings was judge D. Murray Lyle, Strathallan Salers, Dunblane, Perthshire. Murray first introduced Salers to his farm ten years ago, with the purchase of some six heifers. Numbers at Strathallan have grown steadily and the herd now comprises of 25 cows.

Waltzing through the classes to reign supreme as female champion and overall champion was Bacardi Matilda, a December-2017 born cow by Seawell Kitemark, out of Bacardi Keisha with her bull calf at foot Bacardi Topper. Matilda a homebred cow from Roy & Adam Crockett from the Scottish Borders had earlier this year been awarded the overall interbreed championship at Northumberland show and reserve overall interbreed champion at Stirling Show.

Stepping forward to receive the reserve overall champion sash was the July-2018 male champion Beeston Hall Neyo, from local breeders, S & R Hallos, Beeston Hall, Ripponden, Yorkshire. This homebred bull out of Beeston Hall Connie was sired by the French imported bull Jovial.

The reserve male champion was the junior male champion and reserve overall junior champion from Roy and Adam Crockett, Bacardi Shadrack, a April-2022 born Gulliver son out of Cleuchhead Delilah 3rd.

Leading the overall junior section earning the overall junior championship title as well as the junior female champion and reserve female champion rosettes was Rednock Ukraine from Gill and Malcolm Pye of Rednock Estate, Stirling. Ukraine was a March-2022 daughter of Rigel Odessa, sired by Rigel Officer and will be forward at the Salers Cattle Society Premier Sale in Castle Douglas, November where she will be auctioned, and all proceeds will be donated to designated charities in Ukraine.

The reserve junior female came from Steven and Rachel Hallos, Beeston Hall Salers with Beeston Hall Ruby a September-2021 born daughter out of Beeston Hall Dena and sired by the reserve overall champion on the day, Beeston Hall Neyo.

The quality of the pair's competition was exceptional and a sight to behold with eight pairs of Salers on parade and leading the two-step was Rednock Estate followed by Beeston Hall Salers, Bacardi Salers, Rigel Pedigree, C B Farms, Jedforest Livestock, Edgerston Trading (2006) Ltd and Angus and Kerry Gowthorpe.

The finale was the group of three which was won by Bacardi Salers, followed by Beeston Hall, C B Farms and Angus and Kerry Gowthorpe.

On Friday, Lewis Ralston from Jedforest Livestock, Jedburgh, stood 5th in an exceptionally strong beef young handlers 15 - 16 year old class and Gwawr


Griffiths, Parys Salers, Angelesey was 2nd in the 17 – 20 year old class.

# THE DAYLIGHT SHONE AT ROYAL WELSH SHOW 2023

The Royal Welsh Show 2023 showcased the hardworking profitable Salers in all their glory and the results focussed on the easy calving females that outstrip any breed in maternal capability. The modest entries reflected the breeds biggest attribute, low maintenance, favoured by those who are busy and need a breed that requires very little intervention. However, that did not detract from the quality put forward to Mr Glen Welsh of Garpel Farms. Glen no stranger to the show ring, both as a judge and at the end of the halter, runs 1500 Blackface ewes and 70 predominantly Salers cross Galloway cows over the farm which extends to over 6,500 acres of mostly hill ground.

Despite the rains and dark clouds, dawn broke for Gwawr Griffiths when Glen tapped out her cow, Felin Mona Mai, born in April-2017 by Illiami and out of Felin Elisha.M, as female champion, and then overall champion. She was shown with a calf at foot and was bred by SG & HG Pritchard, Llangybi.

Standing reserve overall champion and reserve female champion was also a heifer from Gwawr Griffiths, a Jalabert daughter out of Preenbank Lady Priscilla, Preenbank Rosella born in March – 2021 and bred by Fred & Bryn Robinson. Gwawr picked her out at a Society Sale earlier in the year at Welshpool, May 2023.

Standing third was Bertie Facon's, Murphy sired heifer out of imported cow Oleron, Gentons Rosette was born in January-2021. Fourth place went to another heifer, Gwawr Griffiths diligently selected for her Parys herd, in Welshpool, May 2023, this time it was Luchabolsch Guatemala, a Seawell Magic daughter out of Oaklands Jaz born in March 2021, bred by Simon Hill.

The junior female champion and overall junior champion was the 5th prize homebred heifer again from Gwawr, Parys Sweetie Pie, out of the overall champion on the day, Felin Mona Mai by Preenbank Lord Bisto and born in June-2022.

The Society would like to extend a huge thank you to the Royal Welsh Agricultural Show, the sponsors, Gamlins Law and their representative Rachel Wynn Jones. We would like to thank the judge Mr Glen Welsh and our exhibitors who put on a tremendous show. The strength and breadth of cattle on show only helps to build the breed and I look forward to encouraging new and returning breeders to this fantastic stage next year.

# BREED HISTORY AND CHARACTERISTICS

#### **BREED ORIGIN AND HISTORY**

Salers (pronounced Sa'lairs) originate in the Southern half of the Massif Central in the Auvergne region of France. It has a rough and variable climate, and though higher, 2000-6000 ft, is very similar to our Lake District and the Highlands of Scotland and Wales. The Salers is one of the oldest breeds in the world, with prehistoric cave paintings suggesting that a similar type of animal has been bred in the area for 7-10,000 years.

They appear to be closely related to the old Celtic breeds and the African breeds, and were probably located in the Massif Central when red cattle migrated from Africa through the Iberian Peninsular and on into northern Europe and the British Isles.

#### **BREED IMPROVEMENT**

What is certain is that Devons, Durhams, (Shorthorns) and West Highland cattle were imported into the Salers area in the mid 19th Century with the intention of improving the breed. At the same time a M. Tyssandier D'Escous challenged the introduction of outside blood and set about improving the Salers by selecting from within the breed.

His method was considered most successful, and he became known as the Father of the Breed. A statue honouring his work stands in the middle of the small mediaeval town of Salers from which the breed takes its name.

From that time until well into the 20th century the breed was improved and developed as a triple purpose animal, Milk-Meat-Draught.

Traditionally, this involved the simultaneous production of milk for cheese and a calf for beef production. In 1925 milk recording became compulsory and weight recording started in 1962.

Resulting from all this improvement and recording has emerged the ideal suckler cow with bred-in foraging ability, able to utilise and thrive on native grasses and forage both summer and winter.

# BREED CHARACTERISTICS AND QUALITIES

The difficult environmental conditions where the Salers breed developed makes it ideal for the poorer areas of the British Isles and today's beef industry. Salers are usually horned with a dark red coat, though there have always been some with black coats. Polled Salers were once very rare. Since the mid '90s, the availability of polled and/ or black fullblood Salers has increased due to the efforts of UK breeders. The skin and pigmented membranes are brown and consequently few eye or udder problems occur. A good hair coat which becomes thick and curly in winter gives hardiness and adaptability to cold and heat.

Having roamed the mountains for centuries, and been draught animals they have developed strong legs and good feet with black hooves. Consequently the cattle can travel long distance over rough ground without developing foot problems. They are equally able to tolerate long periods inside on slats etc. Being one of the oldest and genetically most pure of the European breeds, the Salers produces a positive

effect on the predictability in crossbreeding programmes in a consistent increase in hybrid vigour.

The French National Institute of Agricultural Research has run trials that show that Salers cows and heifers are able to draw on their body reserves when food is scarce to produce sufficient milk for their calf, building them up again quickly when grazing is plentiful. The same trials show that Salers are only fully mature at 5 to 6 years of age.

# **MATERNAL INFLUENCE**

Fixed through its heritage the Salers female displays exceptional maternal qualities of fertility, milking ability, calving ease, hardiness and longevity. High percentage calf crops resulting from the inherent fertility of Salers are realised through early puberty, quick rebreeding and high conception rates coupled with the breeds predictable calving ease and large pelvic structure. Further maternal advantage is realised through the Salers ability to wean a heavy calf and take care of herself. More kilograms at weaning result from the combination of good lactation and lean growth factors.

Suckler cow herd costs are minimised though the breeds foraging ability, winter hardiness and minimal feet, eye and udder problems. Salers are known for their longevity and "wearability" no doubt due to many of the factors stated, stress free calving, good feet and legs etc.

In a survey carried out in France, of over 100,000 Salers cows, 25.1% were 10 years old or over and the calving interval was 374 days.

Bulls are known for their ability to cover large numbers of females and in the ranching countries bull numbers have been halved and calving percentages have risen, another valuable saving on herd costs.

Salers are a unique breed that combine high carcass quality and fast growth rate yet calve easily.

More live calves per cow put to the bull means more £££s and it all begins with a trouble free birth. Vigorous calves born with moderate birth weights and slender long foetal conformation have gained Salers a proven reputation for easy calving. Salers sired calves offer the cowman the unique combination of increased weaning weights with less management at calving.

The dam and the sire both influence the weight and shape of the calf at birth. Salers calves are relatively light at birth, about 36 kg for heifers and 38 kg for bulls, they are also long and rather flat in shape, it is this

feature which makes the Salers bull very popular for crossing with commercial and dairy heifers.

The Salers influence contributes a large pelvic area to cross bred replacement females and will allow commercial suckler cowmen to utilise heavily muscled terminal sires in a cross breeding programme with less concern about calving difficulties.

# **FEEDING AND CARCASS**

The final measurement of a breeds capabilities is the economic production of a lean, nutritious and palatable protein product. That is what beef production is all about, Salers consistently produce the product that the industry and consumer demand. Salers and their crosses are being proven both by the feeder and the butcher.

Competitive live weight gains and efficient feed conversion have been documented by the feeder, whilst the butcher appreciates carcasses that are of industry acceptable weight from approximately 10-16 months and producing top grades. Salers cattle are extremely flexible in the finishing yard enabling feeders to make the best of the markets highs and lows.

The Salers is a carcass breed that calves easily and consistently produces carcasses that are high in quality and lean in composition. Salers are producing an industry preferred product that is making the breeder, the feeder, the butcher, and the retailer take notice.

# THE BEGINNINGS OF SALERS IN THE U.K.

In the spring of 1984, a herd of Salers was founded in Cumbria - 60 females and 4 bulls with as wide a genetic base as possible. Consequently, heifers by 45 different sires and 4 bulls completely unrelated to each other were imported into the U.K. from France.

All the cattle were first choices. Growth rate, docility, femininity, straight top lines and correct legs were the main criteria for selection. All dams, and granddams where possible, were inspected and had to come up to the same standard. In that importation were two females carrying the poll factor. All lived up to expectations, bred and gave no calving problems whatsoever.

From the original importation Salers cattle quickly spread all over the British Isles from the Shetlands to Cornwall and Ireland. The Salers Cattle Society of the U.K. was formed by Bryan Walling, Robert Hudson, Fiona Walling, Thomas Dobson and Bruce Worsley of Crosthwaite, Kendal.

The first AGM was held in November 1986, at that point there were a mere 10 members. Bryan Walling was elected as first Chairman.

Since then the breed has continued to expand, with over 1000 Salers being registered annually by around 175 members.

The Society is divided into Areas and is governed by a Council made up from the Area Representatives.




# **BIRTH WEIGHT EBVS**

The Salers has a firmly established and fully justified reputation for being truly easy calving, which underpins the growth of the breed as the "Ultimate Suckler Cow". Whereas conformation and to some extent growth rate can be assessed by eye, calving ease rests on qualities that can't be judged by inspection of live animals (when selecting a new herd sire for example), namely the combination of low birth weight, large pelvic area and slim calf conformation. In this context, the birth weight EBV calculated by Breedplan is an objective guide, backed and proven by data, and is a key tool to help all of us preserve the Salers exceptional calving ease.




This chart shows the upward trend, by year of birth, in the % of full blood and purebred calves notified to the Society that come with a birth weight and calving ease score. The Society acknowledges the strong commitment of our breeders to provide this data so comprehensively, which ensures that the birth weight EBV is both accurate and a true "across the breed" comparison.

Breedplan works best when breeders submit data for all their calves, the bad with the good, as it is not the absolute values but the differences within a comparable group of calves that drive the calculation. Getting the full set has its challenges, but as this chart shows, 2/3 of our breeders succeed in providing birth weights for all the calves they notify. Outstanding!



The good news is that a large proportion of the Published Sires have low or moderate birth weight EBVs, and the trend in actual birth weights remains within the normal range of fluctuations.

# PRE-SALE CHECKLIST

Closing Dates: The closing date will be stipulated in the sale schedule. The schedule will be advertised www.salers.uk and via the designated auctioneers. Entries must be accompanied by a herd health declaration, copies of health scheme certificates and any necessary test results and documentation requested in the schedule. Late entries or entries with incomplete documentation may be rejected.

**Tagging:** All animals must be double tagged in accordance with current legislation.

Herd Health: Animals must meet the requirements of the Salers Society Herd Health regulations. Vendors must complete and submit a Salers Society Herd Health Declaration for each sale. This should be accompanied by your health scheme provider's Owners Declaration of Health Status listing the ear tags of your entries. Be aware that entries of animals not born in your herd may need a separate health certificate depending on the health status of their herd of origin. You will be required to display your CHeCS Herd Health Certificate, or a Health Declaration Pen Card for each animal, supplied by the CHeCs Approved Health Scheme of which you are required to be a member.

Herd Health Requirements: All cattle, pedigree and commercial, entered for official Society sales must satisfy the following.

BVD Accredited Herd: Entries must be vaccinated with an approved vaccine no more than 12 months prior to the date of sale.

BVD not Accredited Herd: The individual animals which have entered must be tested free of BVD virus and vaccinated at least two weeks prior to the sale date. Females that are sold in-calf or running with the bull must be individually tested and vaccinated before service, with the BVD status of the bull being determined before he serves any females that are to be sold.

Johne's: Members wishing to enter animals for sale must be a member of a CHeCs Approved or comparable Health Scheme and have a risk classification of 1-4 for the disease. (www.checs.co.uk).

Beta-mannosidosis: All Fullblood and Purebred animals must have a non-carrier DNA status for betamannosidosis. TB: All entries must comply with current TB pre-movement testing requirements. Cattle coming to Scotland from 1 or 2 year TB testing areas must have passed a TB test within the previous 60 days of the movement. This applies to all cattle over 6 weeks of age. Animals staying in Scotland must pass a post movement TB test carried out between 60 and 120 days following the movement. The current TB test cannot be carried out twice with 42 days or false results may occur. Proof of testing will have to be provided by yourself and dates of testing announced.

DNA & MYOSTATIN STATUS: All pedigree bulls must have a DNA profile and have been tested for myostatin, the result will be made visible in the catalogue. All females for sale at society sales, including production Salers but not commercial animals, are to be tested for myostatin, unless they have a myostatin status of MOP (Myostatin free by Parentage) again the results will be visible in the sale catalogue.

Eyes: The veterinary surgeon may examine the animal's eyes to ensure that the retinas and lenses are sound. The vet retains the right to reject an animal for eye defects.

**Dentition:** The veterinary surgeon will check the dentition is correct and the incisor teeth are biting on the upper pad. Animals will be rejected from the sale if the vet determines that their bite is severely overshot or undershot.

Scrotal Size: All bulls will have their testicles examined by a vet. Testicles should be firm and even sized. Bulls deemed by the vet to have defective testicles will be rejected from the sale. The circumference at the widest part of the scrotum will be measured and should be 32cms at 12 months of age, 34cms at 18-24 months of age and 36cms over 24 months of age. The measured scrotal circumference will be displayed on the pen, and the Society may require the Auctioneer to announce in the ring that a bull does not meet our standards.

**Teats:** All female animals will be put through the crush and have their udders / teats examined for defects by the vet. They may be rejected from the sale if significant defects are found.

**Diseases etc:** Check the animals are free from warts (pay particular attention to the sheath and scrotal areas), Ringworm, Mange, Lice or other contagious diseases.

Treatments: If your entries are showing signs of any of the above conditions and have been treated then a signed veterinary certificate to that effect must accompany your entry.

Locomotion: Check the animal's feet and legs are sound and the general locomotion is satisfactory. The animal may be rejected from the sale if the Society Inspector determines that it is defective in its legs, feet or locomotion. Where possible, allowance will be made for animals that have had a long journey time to the mart.

Docility: All pedigree entries (excluding production females) are to be halter trained and led using bull ring, or nose clip/bulldog for females. The animal may be rejected from the sale if the Society Inspector determines that it is displaying unruly behaviour.

Conformation and Condition: Check the animals are of good conformation and in good condition and meet the minimum weight for age standard as per the Society rulings. The measured weight for bulls will be displayed on the pen, and the Society may require the Auctioneer to announce in the ring that a bull does not meet our standards.

Declarations: If semen has been taken from a bull, this must be declared for inclusion in the catalogue, along with the number of straws retained. If females have been flushed, this must be declared for inclusion in the catalogue, along with the number of embryos retained. If females are in-calf by AI, this must be declared in the catalogue and AI certificates must be provided.

Following arrival at the sale premises all pedigree cattle are subject to an official inspection conducted by a veterinary surgeon and a Society Inspector.

The aim of the inspection is to ensure that all animals sold at sales are of a consistently high quality and are free from any health and/or structural defects.

To avoid the disappointment of having cattle rejected, members should carry out checks before consigning Salers cattle to Society sales.

Further information regarding Society rulings re health, testicle size, and weight for age can be found on the Society website or from the Secretary

# USEFUL SOCIETY INFORMATION

#### **ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTION:**

Subscriptions are due and payable on 1<sup>st</sup> January each year. No invoice will be sent so it would be helpful if all members would please pay promptly. V.A.T. receipts will be sent on payment. Payment can be made by Standing Order.

#### **REGISTRATIONS:**

No calves can be registered unless the sire has been DNA tested and the result lodged with the society.

The poll/horn status is to be recorded as part of the registration. The poll/horn status can be amended if required and a new warranty issued. Up to the age of 12 months of age this is free of charge, and thereafter the normal fee for a replacement warranty applies. Polled animals must include either Poll or Polled in the name.

In accordance with the EU Zootechnical Regulations 2016/1012, the Society will maintain an accurate record of Salers animals and genetic material (semen, embryos, oocytes) born in or imported (without discrimination on account of their country of origin).

The UK Herdbook comprises a Main Herd Register containing two Classes, Full Blood and Purebred, and a Supplementary (Grade) Register.

Imported animals/genetics will be registered in the UK Class equivalent to the Class of the exporting country Herdbook as specified on the Export Zootechnical Pedigree Certificate

From 31/3/2019, members must establish, prior to registration and acceptance into the main register, the Myostatin status of all male animals via a DNA test, unless they are known to be myostatin free by parentage (M0P).

From 1/1/2024 all males and females must have a myostatin free status (M0) confirmed by a DNA test or by parentage (M0P) to be accepted into the Main Register.

# A.I. CERTIFICATES MUST ACCOMPANY REGISTRATIONS IF APPROPRIATE:

Registrations of calves conceived by Al must be accompanied by supporting documentary evidence e.g. Al certificate or other. The sire of the calf got by Al must be registered as an Al sire with the Society. From 1 Jan 2021 the registration of an Al sire must be accompanied with documentation showing where the semen was collected and that the collection was done in accordance with the prevailing legislation to ensure eligibility for that semen to be used in the UK or for export to or from the UK as appropriate.

Some semen owners use the Sire Certificate system. Do check when buying semen and remember to forward the Sire Certificate with the A.I. Certificate and Registration Form.

# THE GRADE REGISTER:

The Supplementary Grade Register is for female animals in a Grading Up program that do not meet the requirements to be entered in the Purebred Class of the Main Register. Females registered in the Supplementary (Grade) Register can be registered in the Purebred Class if they have a valid three generation pedigree, are confirmed non-carrier for beta-mannosidosis and myostatin free (M0) by DNA test, and have been inspected for conformance to the Breed Standard.

Grade A, B and C females will be registered in the Grade Register. Only Full Blood bulls can be used in a grading up program. Though not recommended, a Purebred bull (31/32 or greater) may be used on a Grade C female and her heifer calf be registered as a Grade C.

Following its first calving, a Grade C cow may be designated as Purebred and transferred to the Herd Book, subject to passing an inspection for conformity to Breed Standard and being tested non-carrier for beta-mannosidosis. Application for inspection must be made in writing to the Secretary. On passing the inspection, to effect the transfer the original warranty and transfer fee must be forwarded to the Secretary. This cow's calves can then be registered as Purebred according to the table. Grade C cows are transferred as 7/8 PB no matter what % Salers blood they actually are.

#### **UK HERD BOOK NUMBER:**

The herd book number is now the UK tag number as the unique identification of each animal.

#### **IMPORTATION OF CATTLE:**

It is recommended that all cattle are tested free from bluetongue prior to importation and the negative test paperwork should be sent to the Society office along with all the other relevant documentation. Failure to produce this documentation will delay the importation process and the Society will instead require a copy of the DEFRA Revocation of Notice Prohibiting the Movement of Specific Animals (MR04).

Imported females must have a three-generation pedigree export certificate issued by the Society of the country of origin and confirmation of their non-carrier status for betamannosidosis, and myostatin M0 status for all nine mutations via a DNA test.

Imported males must have a three-generation pedigree export certificate issued by the Society of the country of origin. They must have a DNA profile sent to the Society in excel format (.xls) to be uploaded to the UK lab database and confirmation of their non-carrier status for betamannosidosis, and myostatin M0 status for all nine mutations via a DNA test.

Pregnant imported cattle must have a three-generation pedigree certificate issued by the Society of the country of origin for the sire of the in-vitro calf. They must also be accompanied by the sire's DNA profile in excel format (.xls) to be uploaded to the UK lab and confirmation of their noncarrier status for beta-mannosidosis and myostatin M0 status for all nine mutations.

Status by parentage for betamannosidosis and myostatin is specifically not accepted.

The same principles apply to imported semen, embryos and oocytes. As requirements of importation can change, check with the Secretary's office to confirm what is required before you start the importation procedure.

## **EMBRYO TRANSPLANT PROGRAMME:**

Before embarking on an embryo transplant programme, please contact the secretary who will forward the relevant Salers Society forms. Minimum of £11 per animal flushed (up to 10 embryos) thereafter £1 per embryo. After 3 months minimum of £20 per animal flushed (up to 10 embryos) thereafter £2 per embryo. Remember to insert the ET Form No. and Embryo No. on the Calf Registration Form). £28 per Export Certificate plus embryo registration. One zootechnical export certificate covers all embryos from one flush to the same purchaser. The sire and dam of embryos must be registered in the UK Herdbook. Each flush must be registered to obtain embryo number eg.186/3, which is then used to identify the resulting calf when registered.

Calve's names will be followed by the letters ET on the certificate.

In the case of all calves got by embryo transplant, the DNA profile of the dam, confirmation of the dam's noncarrier status for beta-mannosidosis and myostatin M0 status of all nine mutations must be registered with the Society. If the DNA profile relates to an animal out with the UK then the DNA profile should be sent to the Society in excel format (.xls) in order for the profile to be uploaded to the UK lab database.

Imported embryos must be accompanied by a threegeneration zootechnical export certificate issued by the Society of the country of origin.

Imported embryos must also be accompanied by the DNA profile of the sire in excel format (.xls) and confirmation of the sire's noncarrier status for beta-mannosidosis and myostatin M0 status of all nine mutations.

# TRANSFER OF OWNERSHIP:

A fee of £6 + VAT is charged for transfer of ownership. The fee is payable by the purchaser who should obtain the warranty from the seller and forward it to the Secretary for transfer. The transfer of ownership of females must take place from one herd to another before you may register a calf from her.

ALL TRANSACTIONS ARE PLUS VAT. NO TRANSACTIONS ARE COMPLETE UNTIL ALL MONIES ARE PAID AND PAPERWORK IS CORRECTLY SUPPLIED.

IF PAYING BY BACS PLEASE USE YOUR THREE ALPHABETICAL DIGITS FROM YOUR HERD REFERENCE AS THE PAYMENT REFERENCE.

IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE MEMBER TO GET ALL RELEVANT PAPERWORK TO THE SOCIETY ON TIME OR LATE PENALTIES WILL BE INCURRED.

# PEDIGREE REGISTRATION ROYALTY SCHEME FOR AI SIRES

AIM: If a member has collected semen from a registered bull in his/her ownership, or has acquired the sole rights to semen in the UK, for imported or purchased semen and wishes to sell semen at commercial production prices to encourage commercial use, yet retain a higher return for pedigree use by charging a separate levy free on registration of pedigree calves, he/she can apply to the Society to register the bull as a Pedigree Registration Royalty Sire.

# Involvement of The Society:

The Salers Society of the UK and its secretary will merely be the tools by which those calves gain their registration, in a Pedigree Registration Royalty Scheme, which is an arrangement between the vendor of the semen and the breeder who wishes to register a calf, which is the result of using this semen.

- Before any calves can be registered from the table below a Sire Certificate must be obtained from the owner and enclosed with the Birth Registration Form.
- The late registration penalty will apply if time is taken to obtain the Sire Certificate.
- Registration fees will apply on the date all paperwork is correctly supplied.
- · No advance payments will be accepted.

## **SIRE CERTIFICATES:**

A system has been set up for registering calves got by a non-owned sire. Service may either be by A.I. or natural. In these cases a Sire Certificate must be obtained from the owner of the bull/semen and forwarded with the registration form (and A.I. form if appropriate). The cost of the Sire Certificate is negotiable privately between the owners of the dam and the owners of the bull or semen. Sire certificates can be obtained from the Secretary at the cost of £30 per 10 certificates. The Secretary must be informed if the owner of a bull or semen wishes to use the Sire Certificate system (otherwise registrations may be accepted without a Sire Certificate and the owner would lose the service fee).





















